RETURN OF THE IRON GUARDS.

Col. W. H. East, and the remaining few members of the Iron Guards, who left Columbia county over three years ago, for the Union Army, and have formed a part of the Pennsylvania Reserve Corps of the Army of the Potomac, returned on Thursday last to Bloomsburg.

They arrived in the morning train from Harrisburg. They were met by crowds of anxious friends at the Depot, with music and flags were escorted into the Court House yard. Rev. J. R. Dimm, then addressed them in a neat and appropriate speech.

On Wednesday morning Kautz and Smith attacked the Confederate entrenchments in front of Petersburg. As this town is on the south bank of the Appomattox, and of little military value, the army at once began to retreat across the river.

On Tuesday last everything was quiet in front of Marietta, in Georgia. There had been a rain for two days, which made the roads impassable and prevented movements by either Johnston or Sherman.

STILL LATER.

At eleven o'clock on Wednesday morning last Gen. Smith, from Bermuda Hundred, reached the outer line of the Confederate works northeast of Petersburg, running from Dutch Gap to Port Waltham.

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LATE WAR NEWS.

It seems to be evident that General Lee started as soon as General Grant in the late movement from the Chickahominy. Correspondents represent that for three or four days before Grant's march, there were unmistakable evidences of the diminiting of the Confederate forces in the Federal front.
