The general plan is the same as the old act, though no bank can now be organized with a less capital than \$100,000 in small towns, and \$200,000 in cities having a population of over five hundred thousand. Banks must redeem at par at the national banks in certain designated cities regarded as commercial centres, East and West. The limit of \$300,000,000 upon circulation and capital is not retained.
