PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION. WHEREAS, in and by an Act of General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An Act to regulate the General Elections within this Commonwealth."

On TUESDAY, THE FIRST DAY OF NOVEMBER, being the First Tuesday in said month, at which time Twenty Six Electors, for a President and Vice President of the United States are to be elected.

I also make known that the places of holding the Elections in the several townships throughout the county, are as follows:

Bloom township, at the Court House, in Bloomsburg. Benton township, at the Public House of John J. Sules, in the Town of Benton.

Beaver township, at the Public House of Franklin L. Shuman. Briarclark township, at the Public School House, in Eastonville.

Borough of Berwick, at the Town House, in the Borough. Catawissa township, at the Public House of Samuel Koenigsbender.

Genoa township, at the House of Jeremiah Hess, deceased. Conowingo township, at the Public House of Reuben Wassatz.

Fishing Creek township, at the Public House of Benjamin McElroy. Franklin township, at Clayton's School House.

Greenwood township, at the House of Joseph K. Patton. Hemlock township, at the "Back Horn" in Jackson township, at the House of Ezekiel Cole.

Locust township, at the Public House of John L. Hurst, in Slatersburg. Millin township, at the Public House of John Keller.

him that he is of the age aforesaid, and give such other evidence as is required by this act, whereupon the name of the person so admitted to vote shall be inserted in the alphabetical list by the Inspector.

In all cases where the name of the person claiming to vote is not found on the list furnished by the County Clerk, or his list to voters, whether found thereon or not, it is objected to by any qualified citizen.

If any person shall prevent or attempt to prevent any officer of an election, under this act, from holding such election, or use or threaten any violence to any such officer, and shall interrupt or improperly interfere with him in the execution of his duty, shall be liable to arrest, or to be imprisoned for not less than one month, and not more than six months, nor be fined more than one thousand dollars.

It is further directed that the election of the several districts shall be opened between the hours of 8 and 10 o'clock in the forenoon, and shall continue open without interruption and adjournment until 7 o'clock in the evening, when the polls shall be closed.

It is further directed that the meeting of Return Judges at the COURT HOUSE in Bloomsburg, to make out the General Election, will be on the FOURTH OF NOVEMBER next.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, That every person occupying Justices of the Peace who shall hold any office or appointment of profit, honor or emolument in the United States, or of this State, or any city or corporation, whether a commissioner or officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent who is or shall be employed under the Legislature, executive or judicial department of this State, or of any city or corporation, shall not act as a Justice, Judge or other officer of such election.

In case the person who shall have received the highest number of votes for any person shall not attend on the day of any election, then the person who shall have received the second highest number of votes for Judge at the next preceding election shall act as Inspector in his place.

No person shall be permitted to vote at any election as aforesaid, than a white citizen of the age of twenty-one or more, who shall have resided in this State at least one year, and in the election district where he offers to vote, ten days immediately preceding such election.

No person shall be permitted to vote whose name is not contained in the list of taxable inhabitants, furnished by the Commissioners, unless: First, he produce a receipt of payment, within two years of State or County tax assessed agreeably to the Constitution, and give satisfactory evidence on his own oath or affirmation of another that he has paid such a tax, or in failure to produce a receipt shall make oath to the payment thereof; or second, if he claim a right to vote by being an elector between the age of twenty-one and twenty-two years shall depose on oath or affirmation that he has resided in the State at least one year before his application, and make such proof of residence in the district as is required by this act.
