The Bloomsburg Local Senate proposes to discuss, on next Friday evening, the propriety of amending the Constitution of the United States, so as to prohibit African Slavery.

Three cent pieces of copper and nickel have been authorized by last act of Congress, and the issue of fractional currency under five cents is to be prohibited.

SEVENTY persons confined in the jail of the District of Columbia have been sold as substitutes. The officers of the jail, all loyal men, pocketed the money obtained from these criminals, and they are turned out to disgrace the army and return to their old practice.

A GENERAL BOUNTY BILL was discussed and passed in the House of Representatives of Pennsylvania. It allows the different townships, wards &c., to pay five hundred dollars local bounty to each volunteer. The amount to be raised by taxation and a per capita tax not exceeding twenty-five dollars.

ABRAHAM LINCOLN by authority of a late act of Congress, has issued a proclamation offering a pardon to all deserters who will report themselves to their proper regiments and companies within sixty days after the 4th of March 1865, and giving notice that all deserters not returning to service shall be, by the act of Congress, deprived of all rights of citizenship, and shall be forever incapable of holding any office of trust or profit under the United States.

ROBERTY—Mr. Geo. L. Johnson, of Orange township, in this county, few nights ago, had his house broken open and robbed of about \$600. It is said, that Mr. Johnson heard the thieves in his house, but from prudential motives, did not molest them. This is the same unfortunate Mr. Johnson, who lost his wallet, some two months ago, containing about \$250 in greenbacks—Col. Democrat.

LUCKY EDITORS.—The draft wheel, in its recent revolutions in Philadelphia, turned out the following members of the corps editorial: Wm. V. M'Kean, of the Ledger, D. B. LICENSERS.—We have been requested by JESSE COLEMAN, Prothonotary of Columbia county, to notify Hotel and Saloon keepers, that the law requires all persons desiring to obtain license at May Court, to have their petitions filed in his office, at least twenty-one days prior to the meeting of Court, in order that their applications may receive the legal publication.
