Court.—The regular May term of Court will commence on Monday next. We anticipate a pretty large attendance. Several interesting cases pending. There will be very little business of a criminal character.

J. C. Hill will commence a term of school in the Academy, at this place, on Monday the 1st of May, to continue eleven weeks. Tuition, from \$4 to \$8 for a full term. Mr. Hill is successor to D. A. Beckley, who has lately been appointed Post Master of this place.

His remains were brought home for interment by Thomas B. Cole and deposited in the burial grounds near Benton. He was a fine young man, much respected by all who knew him, and leaves a wife and young children to mourn his untimely end.
