ANOTHER SOLDIER GONE.—We are again called upon to chronicle the death of another Columbia county soldier, SAMUEL PAXES, of Sagartown, who died near Petersburg, not long since, from the effects of a wound received, while bravely battling for his country in the Union army in front of the rebel works at Petersburg or thereabouts. Mr. Paxes enlisted in the army, nearly a year ago if memory serves us right, to escape the terrible draft which was at that time pending. He served in the nine months service, in the same Regiment with us, and was a brave and obedient soldier, never flagging or shirking responsibilities. This deceased was a man in moderate circumstances, and leaves a family and lots of friends to mourn his death. Peace to his ashes.

MANY of our farmers have planted corn already this season. It has not been so somary to plant before the 15th of this month, but the farmers contend that the ground was in good order—warm, dry and mellow—consequently the seed might as well be put in. Our experience has been that those who planted earliest generally had the best corn. The corn crop is the most important of all the summer crops raised, and too much attention cannot be paid to its cultivation.

THE COURT of Quarter Sessions disposed of applications for license to sell liquor and keep hotels, on Wednesday (to-day). Unless the licenses granted are taken out within fifteen days they will be forfeited and the Clerks will not issue them. Attention to this may save trouble.

DEATH OF A SOLDIER.—The body of our townsmen, MICHAEL REIFENDELER, was brought home on Saturday, and interred at this place on Sabbath last. He died of fever at Roanoke Island, North Carolina, where he was serving in the capacity of a private soldier. He left this place in March last, to avoid the draft which was hanging over him. So far as we can speak, he was an industrious, quiet, good citizen. A wife and several children are left to mourn his sudden and unexpected demise. Aged about thirty-five or forty.

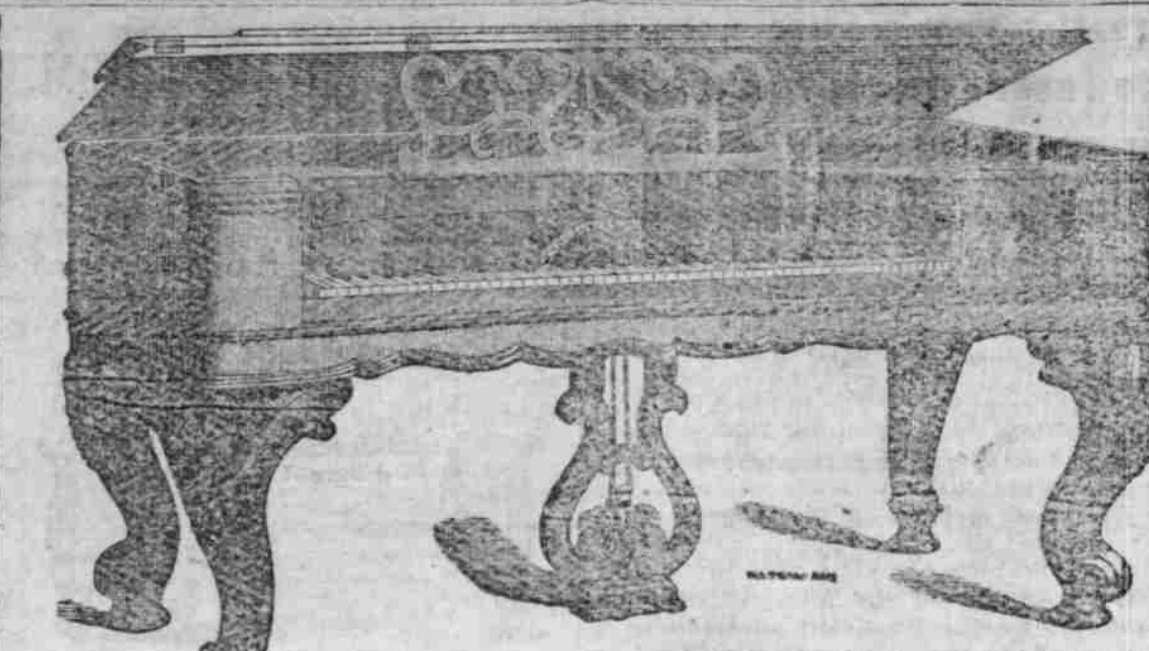
