DEMOCRATIC STATE CONVENTION. The Democratic State Convention for the nomination of a candidate for Governor of Pennsylvania, will meet in the hall of the House of Representatives, at Harrisburg, on Monday, the 31st day of March 1866, at 10 o'clock P. M.

We own our patrons an apology for the issuing of a half sheet this week, as well as an explanation of the cause. C. W. McKelvy & Co. of the Calawissa paper mill, by which we have been supplied with paper for years, suspended, a few days ago, making paper of the size required for the Star, immediately upon being informed of this, we went to Philadelphia and there purchased a quantity of paper, sufficient to last us some months. It was shipped in time to have been brought to us as early as Friday or Saturday of last week, but it has not come yet.

For this reason we are compelled to do that which we very much regret, and which we believe has never been done by us, or those connected with the Star formerly, since the paper was established. We have barely enough paper to issue a half sheet. Many interesting articles intended for this number, are of necessity, held over for next week.

A more energetic, more reliable or more industrious man than Judge Mercer, we do not know. While on the Bench he made a reputation as wise as our broad State, and he possesses the elements that are calculated to give him a national reputation in Congress. This District will yet see the day when it will not only realize the wisdom of its selection but feel proud of its Representative.

We clip the above remarks from the Republican of the 25th inst. They were published immediately after the passage of the bill, in the House of Representatives, striking out the word "white" in all ordinances and acts in force in the District of Columbia for which Mercer voted. The Republican is therefore in favor of negro suffrage. But as to his remarks. Let us see that Mercer is reliable? No. Mercer is false to his promises and declarations. He was elected under representations, by himself and by his friends, and by the Republican press of his district, that he was opposed to negro suffrage, and yet he votes directly for an act to give unequal privileges of voting to the negro; he votes to make the negro the political equal of the white man. The Republican says this is a representative to "feel proud of!" And these are the "elements" which the Republican approves, and says, "are calculated to give him a national reputation in Congress." A national reputation? We think a negro—a black and foul—reputation is the truth.

BRADLEY, the militia lawyer of the Resolute, who was condemned lately by a military court at Charleston, S. C., to one year's imprisonment in Fort Pulaski, for inciting the slaves to insurrection and taking possession of lands and property, has been released on parole by order of Boss Stanton. Although thousands of white men have suffered months and years in prison for no offence whatever, unable to catch the ear of the eye of the Secretary of War, or by any means to excite his sympathies in their behalf, not a single twist of wool in any part of the Union can be put in jeopardy without his notice, and the interposition of his acceding offices. That shows the advantage of being orthodoxly colored.

PEOPLE OF COLUMBIA COUNTY remember that JUDGE MERCUR the Abolition Member of Congress from this District votes in the House of Representatives for negro suffrage. Remember that MERCUR is willing to make the negro the equal of the white man. Remember that he votes to call the black man to the polls to vote side by side with you; to vote with you and to vote against you.

During the performance of the ceremonies of baptism, at the Creek, on Sunday afternoon, there was a great deal of disturbance made by intoxicated persons. Two of the fellows were promptly taken in hand by Constable Evans and conducted to the care of Sheriff Snyder. Served them right. No person should attend at such, or any other meeting, except with the intention of behaving properly.

BLACK! BLACK! BLACK! MERCUR voted for negro suffrage in the House of Representatives. The Shoddy majority, in the Pennsylvania Senate, passed a resolution endorsing the action of Congress to force negro suffrage upon the people of the District of Columbia. The Columbia County Republican approves all this. Will the Shoddy Abolition voters support these acts? If they do, they must agree to support that which will follow, namely, NEGRO SUFFRAGE IN PENNSYLVANIA.
