The earth, says the Scientific American owes more to art than to nature after all. Fill the effect of clover and plaster on sand plains was discovered, our barrens were as unproductive as rocks. Since that discovery, however, they have become the most valuale farms in the State. Till art fook hold of apples, the largest one grown was about the size of a walnut; the cabbage of nature was nothing but sea-kale, while nature's unsophistic ated peach was little better than a poison. Indeed, without art the product of our whole state might yet be carried to market in wheelbarrows while the value of our lands would be about equal to those of the Rocky Mountaids. The invention of the cotton-gin increased the value of South Carolina land twenty-five per cent., because it saved that much in the expense of harvesting the crop. Without the plough, any land might be purchased for a shilling an acre. This being the case our farmers should take more interest in the progress of machinery than even our artizans. Not only their sweat, but their very substance depends upon it. Till the horse rake was invented gathering hay into cocks was one of the most laborious works connected with the farm. Now, it is one of the easiest and most delightful, and what is true of mowing is the same of all the other toilsome work that has long been considered neces sary to turn manure into bread.

Hottow Honn.-It is familiar to far mers that, when any animal has been subject to this disease, in winter the complaint will return again frequently. The complaint may often be kept off in such on through the winter. As soon as the horn begins to become carious, it becomes internally sore, and it sometime happens that all efforts to save an animal afflicted with this complaint are ineffectual, merely for the want of wrapping the horns, and thereby imparting that warmth to the parts intended to be healed, which all know is necessary for any wound or sore in winter in order to heal it .- Albany Cultivator.

COOKING FOOD FOR STOCK.

The Albany Cultivator says:-We are frequently asked whether the cooking of food for stock, by steam or otherwise, would be profitable. So far as regards feeeding cattle, we are without any reliable experiments which have been made in this country to test this point. The subject has attracted much attention in Egland and Scotland, and the results of several experiments there made have ben recorded-These experiments seem mostly to lead to the conclusion, that though in some instances cooked food does produce a greater gain than the same amount of raw food, yet the advantage of the former is not sufficient to defray the expenses. In feeding hogs however, especially where grain of any kind is used, the advantage of cooking seems generally to be admitted. We are also inclined to think that there may be advantages in partially cooking some kinds of food for cattle-such as cornstalks, chaff or straw, which by this means becomes more palateable, and the nutriment they contain rendered more soluble, and more easily assimilated. The whole subject of feeding animals, however, is one deserving of more thorough investigation than it is has here received, and we would extrestly commend it to the attention of of our agricultural societies.

It is not generally known, we believe. that lamp oil or fish oil of any kind, (that . which in inferior is equally as good for this purpose as that of a better quality,) poured at the root of the peach tree, will effectually prevent the ravages of the worm that has heretofore proved so destructive to that valuable fruit tree.
