Harsimus, we presume, is a locality within reach of the New York market. RAISING FRUIT TREES.

A correspondent in Virginia, makes the following inquiries:

Will apple, pear, and quince seeds lose their vitality by being kept dry in boxes 6 tor 18 months ?

They probably would be more or less Injured, and perhaps in some cases wholly profled. Pear seeds have been kept dry for a few months, and, after exposure to moisture and frost, have vegetated finely. In other cases, apple and pear seeds, so treated, have nearly failed. Security would direct that the seeds be kept moderately from the fruit. After having become much dried, moisture and frost operate in softching and splitting the horny covering.

Should peach stones be planted imme of the fruit is taken from them, and will they come up well when taken from under the trees and planted late in the admin where they may have been lying since they fell from the tree; and will the stones which have been kept dry the same length of time, come up as well as if plant-ed fresh !

In all cases, the seeds of fruit trees are best if as fresh as possible; but peach stones may be kept some months dry with small injury. Some nurserymen plant them after the lapse of a year, but they do not often succeed so well. Under the tree, shaded from the sun, and in contact with the moist earth, they might dry but little : and, again, if in hot sunshine and on dusty ground, they might suffer severely. They should always be cracked before planting. in which case freezing is not necessary, but only facilitates the splitting of the stone. Too much moisture spoils them. Albany Cultivator.

COOKED FOOD FOR HOGS. We were informed by H. L. Ellsworth, Esq., that he had satisfied himself by experiment of the advantages arising from using cooked corn meal as food for swine. which desiring to fatten them. He stated en and a balf nounds of cooked meal would cause as much growth as fifty one pounds of raw meal.

We commenced the experiment our selves about six weeks ago, with a pen of 24 hogs, and thus far the result has been entirely satisfactory, as the hogs are fully fattened without consuming any greater weight of meal, than they used raw before commencing the present experiment.

Sixty gallons of water is caused to boil in a large kettle, and thirty pounds of Indian meal stirred in while boiling; in 20 minutes the mass becomes geletanous; the fire is now withdrawn or suffered to burn out. As much of this mixture is given to the hogs as they will eat three times a day. Immediately after finishing their meal they go to their sleeping room, and appear to be fully employed in digesting what they have eaten. These hogs were thin when they commenced using the cooked food; and are now fat enough to kill.

GRAFTING WAX .- Many mixtures have been proposed for this use, and each in turn has been laid aside for cause. What is called by sculptors "modelling wax" is the best, as it is entirely proof against water, and its contraction by cold or softening by heat is not sufficient either to cause it to run or crack. It may be pressed into any form without breaking up granular or mealy. Melt bees wax, and while melted stirin about one quarter the weight of balsam of fir, (Canada balsam.) If poured, while hot, on thin tissue paper, laid on a circumstances. This peculiar feature of our busi smooth surface, it may be cut in strips and so used conveniently. If in sticks or balls the warmth of the hand and slight working will render it soft, so as to be pressed over the incision and around the scion. If a small quantity of vermillion is added, it will be of a beautiful red color, and insects will not travel over it to attack the scion.

To cornect Damaged Grain .- Musty grain, totally unfit for use, and which can careely be ground, may, it is said, be rendered perfectly sweet and sound by immersing it in water and letting it remain until the water becomes cold. The quantity of water must be double that of the grain to be purified. The musty quality rarely penetrates through the husk or bran of the wheat. In the hot water, all the decayed or rotten grains swim upon the surface, so that the remaining wheat is effectually cleansed from all impurities, without any material loss. It is afterwards to be dried stirring occasionally on the kiln.
