ARTICLE XI. OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

Section 1. The State may contract debts, to supply casual deficits or fallures in reveno meet expenses not otherwise provided ues, or to meet expenses not offer who per for; but the aggregate amount of such debts direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the General Assembly, or at different periods of time, shall mover exceed soven hundred and fifty thous, and dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay debts so contracted, and to no other pur-

pose whatever.
Section 2. In addition to the above-limited power the State may contract debis to repeal invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the havasion, suppress 'maurrection, defend the State in war, or to redeem the present outstand-ing indebtedness of the State; but the monoy arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it is raised, or to repay such debts, and to no other pur-

Section 3. Except the debts above specified in sections one and two of this article, no debi

the State. Section 4. To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt con-tracted as aforesaid, the legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amend-ment, create a sinking fund, which shall be sufficient to pay the accruing interest on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thoreof by a sum not less than two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; which sicking fund shall consist of the net annual income of the public works, from time to time owned by the Bute, or the proceeds of the sale of the same. or any part thereof, and of the income or proceeds of sale of stocks owned by the State, together with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by law. The said sinking fund has be increased, from time to time, by as-signing to it may part of the taxes, or other revenues of the State, not required for the currevenues of the State, not required for the cur-rent expenses of government, and unless in case of war, invasion or insurrection; my part of the said sinking fund shall be used or ap-plied otherwise than in extinguishment of the public debt, until the amount of much delt is reduced below the sum of five millions of dol-

lars.
Section 5. The credit of the Common wealth shall not in any manner, or event, be pledged, or loaned to, any individual, companyeerporation, or association; nor shall the Commonwealth hereafter become a joint owner, or stockholder, in any company, association, or

Section of The Commonwealth shall no assume the debt, or any part thereof, of any county, city, borough, or township; or of any corporation, or association; unless such debt shall have been contracted to enable the State to repol invasion, suppress domestic insurrec-tion, defend itself in time of war, or to assist the State in the discharge of any portion of its

present indebtedness.
Section 7. The Legislature shall not authorize any county, city, borough, township, or incorporated district, by virtue of a vote of its citizens or otherwise, to become a stockholder in any company, association, or corporation or to obtain money for, or loan its credit to any corporation, association, institution, or

SECOND AMENDMENT; There shall be an additional article to said Constitution, to be designated as article XII, as follows:

ARTICLE XII:

OF NEW COUNTIES No county shall be divided by a line cutting off over one tenth of its population; (either to form a new county or otherwise,) without the express assent of such county, by a vote of the electors thereof; nor shall any new county be established, counting less than four hun-dred square miles.

THIRD AMENDMENT. From section two of the first article of the Constitution, strike out the words, "of the city onstitution, sinks out the work county respec-tively;" from section five, same article, strike out the words, "of Philadelphia and of the several counties;" from section seven, same ar-ticle, strike out the words, "neither the city of Philadelphia, nor any," and insert in lieu therefore the words, "and no," and strike out section four same article, and in lieu thereof

"Section 4. In the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and in every seventh year thereafter, representatives to the number of one hundred shall be apportioned and distributed equally, through the State, by districts, in proportion to the number of taxable inhabitants in the several parts thereof; except that any county containing at least three thousand five hundred taxables, may be allowed a separate parts on the parts that the parts of th rate representation; but no more than three counties shall be joined, and no county shall be divided, in the formation of a district. Any city containing a sufficient num-ber of taxables to entitle it to at least two representatives, shall have a separate representa-tion assigned it, and shall be divided into condistricts of contiguous territory, o equal taxable population as near as may be-each of which districts shall elect one repre

At the end of section seven, same article, ingett these words, "the city of Philadelphia shall be divided into single sendorial districts, of contiguous territory as nearly equal in taxo lation as possible : but no ward shall ble population as possible; but no vibe divided in the formation thereof."

The legislature, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment, shall divide the city of Philadelphia into senatorial and representative districts, in the manner above prov ded such districts to remain unchanged until the apportionment in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-tour.

FOURTH AMENFMENT: To be section XXVI, Article 1.

The legislature shall have power to alter revoke, or unnul, any charter of incorporation hereafter conferred by, or under, any special, or general law, whenever in their opinion it may be injurious to the citizens of the commonwealth : in such manner, however, that no njustice shall be done to the corporators.




