Superintendent William B. Mc Caleb in Conference This Morning

Better train facilities and additional bridge improvements were urked by members of the lancaster Chamber of Commerce at a conference with Superintendent William B. McCaleb, of the Philadelphia Division, at Lancaster, this morning.

For some time the Lancaster Chamber of Commerce has been active in a movement for a new passenger station, but that is said to be an improvement in the distant future. The Lancaster folks, however, want an early morning train to stop at Lancaster. According to the present schedule Lancaster people cannot get to Philadelphia before 3 o'clock in the morning without leaving Lancaster at 2 a. m.
