Property Willed to Her by Husband as Reward For Marrying Man 25 Years Older Than Herself

York Springs, Pa., Jan. 10.—Mrs. Benjamin Watkins, a York Springs girl, daughter of Mrs. Mary Lory, of this place, is fighting in the New Jersey courts at Camden for \$75,000 of her husband's estate, which she says he willed to her. The wife is 25 years old and the husband, a man 25 years older than herself. According to the widow, who lives in Merchantville, when Watkins proposed marriage to her in 1910 she refused him because he was much older than she. The woman was then 25 and Watkins more than 50. Finally he promised that if she would marry him wold with her his estate amounting to \$75,000 upon his death. Watkins died some months ago and had carried out his part of the agreement
