
Many at Altar.—During the evangelistic campaign at the Wesley Union A. M. Church, six persons have professed conversion and nine others are at the altar in the church.

PHILADELPHIA THERMOMETERS REGISTERED ZERO IN PHILADELPHIA Philadelphia, Jan. 14.—Bitterly cold weather for this section of the Middle Atlantic States continues to-day, but warmer slowly in Philadelphia the weather bureau thermometer at 7 a. m. registered zero.

TWO ABOVE IN WILMINGTON Wilmington, Del., Jan. 14.—Thermometer records over 2 to 5 degrees below zero in outlying, exposed districts and 1 degree above zero generally in the city.

DROP RECORDED IN READING Reading, Pa., Jan. 14.—The severe cold weather continues with a minimum temperature of 2 below zero at 3 a. m. to-day at the local weather bureau, nine degrees lower than registered yesterday morning.

LANCASTER HAS COLD WEATHER Lancaster, Pa., Jan. 14.—This was the coldest morning experienced here for two years, the thermometer in outlying districts registering 10 degrees below zero. The Conestoga is frozen from shore to shore.

11 BELOW IN HAZLETON Hazleton, Pa., Jan. 14.—This has been the coldest day, the thermometer registering 14 below zero in the center of the city.

14 BELOW IN POTTSVILLE Pottsville, Pa., Jan. 14.—This was the coldest morning in two years. In Pottsville the temperature was 13 degrees below zero.

COLD IN ALLENTOWN Allentown, Pa., Jan. 14.—Allentown is experiencing the coldest weather within its limits since January 1912, at daylight to-day registered as low as 5 below zero in the center of the city.

10 BELOW AT SELINGROVE Selingsrove, Pa., Jan. 14.—The thermometer here this morning registered ten degrees below zero.

9 BELOW AT WILKES-BARRE Wilkes-Barre, Pa., Jan. 14.—The mercury on the mountains this morning was down to 20 degrees below zero. In this city it was 9 below; at noon the weather moderated considerably and 5 above zero was recorded.

COLD IN ATLANTIC CITY Atlantic City, N. J., Jan. 14.—The coldest weather since January, 1912, is being experienced in this city. The government weather bureau announced this morning that the temperature was 1 degree below zero.

CLEVELAND FACES COLD Cleveland, Ohio, Jan. 14.—Cleveland faced the coldest of winter to-day when at 8 o'clock the official temperature was two above zero. Reports from outlying districts placed the temperature as low as five degrees below zero.
