New York, Jan. 21.—William Sulzer, former Governor, now an assemblyman, was the chief witness cited to appear this afternoon at the resumption of the so-called John Doe inquiry into political graft, especially as concerns State road construction. During their eriod before and after his removal as governor Sulzer made charges against his enemies, but he did not take the stand at the impeachment proceedings, and his appearance to-day was the first under oath. It was understood that District Attorney Whitman insisted that the witness sign a waiver of immunity.

SERVICES AT ANNVILLE

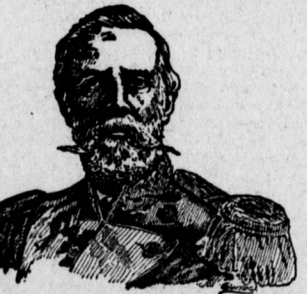

PRESIDENT FORTY YEARS

Annville, Pa., Jan. 21.—At the annual meeting of the stockholders of the Annville National Bank a board of seven directors was chosen. Andrew Krider, the president, heads the directorate in point of service, having been elected for the forty-first consecutive year. The other officers are: Vice-president, Judge C. V.
