The rear brakeman must occupy the last car except when that car is a baggage or private car He must at all times be as near the rear door as possible and be ready to fill the duties of a flagman when required to do so. The front brakeman shall ride on the car next to the baggage car when not assisting the conductor and must not at anytime leave the coach in which he is riding to converse with a passenger, even if the train does not make any stops on the division.

Communicating signals for engineers will be used when the service is not out of order. When the train is ready to start the engineer will be notified to call in the flagman and when the flagman returns to the train the engineer must not overlook the prooper starting signal. If the flagman has not had time to get back the conductor gives the signal to start the train. These rules are not new, but are being posted on some divisions as a safety first feature.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 23.—Indian Commissioner Cato Sells and other officials of the bureau refused to-day to talk about the reports of an investigation of the Carlisle Indian School, but it is known that such an investigation is pending and it is in the hands of Inspector James Linnen.

Superintendent Friedman, of the school, was in Washington to-day and was at the Indian Bureau. Vague charges against Friedman made in various quarters for several months of late, it is understood, took formal shape in the hands of agents of the Indian Rights Association and were laid before the Indian Bureau and the congressional committee on Indian affairs.

The charges included insubordination, failure to enforce discipline among the students of the school and general lack of capacity for administering the institution. There is a strong Impression that the outcome of the investigation will lead to a change of management.
