HARRY BOYER HEADS SCHOOL DIRECTORS

Harrisburg Man Is Honored by State Educational Leaders Meeting Here

Harrisburg, Pa., Feb. 5.—Harry A. Boyer, president of the Harrisburg School Board, was elected president of the directors' department of the State Educational Association at the close of the nineteenth annual convention in Central High School this morning.

A woman director, Mrs. Abbie W. Wilder, of Kennett Square, was made a vice-president.

Howarth, Glen Riddle, treasurer; executive committee, J. Newton Rhoades, Reading; Charles M. Magee, Easton; S. R. McClure, Bradock; T. J. McGinty, Olyphant; W. G. Davis, McKeesport; legislative committee, M. H. Hemming, Wilkesburg; C. G. McGee, Altoona; Dr. J. D. Orr, Leechburg; Frank L. Campbell, Chester; H. M. Lessie, Pottstown; James M. Wuckner, Allentown.

A resolution urging the Legislature to adopt a law putting teachers' training schools in city schools on a par with normal schools of the State, was adopted after Dr. P. E. Downes, superintendent of city schools, made a report on the progress of such a movement before the last Legislature. Dr. Samuel Hamilton, of Allegheny City, made his annual address to the students of Central High School. Dr. Hamilton said the development of thinking is more important than the acquiring of numerous facts. He made a number of humorous references to current events, and quoted Theodore Roosevelt and Woodrow Wilson as types of the thinking men who have acquired high place.

PATROLS RESIDENCE DISTRICT.—A great deal of late night robbery has been prevented in Lincoln, Neb., by the efficient work of the motorcycle policemen who make frequent rounds of the residence districts keeping an eye on suspicious looking men who are found loitering about. FEB. 14 FINAL DAY FOR REMONSTRANCES

Sunday and Three-day Limit Ruling May Have Effect; Lawyers Discuss It

Whether or not Sunday and a strict interpretation of legal requirements fixing the time limit in which to file liquor license remonstrances, may so affect the situation as to establish Saturday, February 14, as the last day for presenting objections, is causing considerable discussion among the members of the Dauphin county bar.

In order to be on the safe side, many attorneys will file objections to any proposed license by Saturday.

License court will be held Thursday, February 19. The law requires that no remonstrances shall be filed later than the third day before the application is heard. If the three-day rule is adhered to strictly, and the Monday, February 16, would be the first of the three days necessary. And as the day immediately preceding will be Sunday, many attorneys contend that Saturday, February 14—a week from to-morrow—will be the final day for filing remonstrances.

Prothonotary Harry F. Heller said no rule as to either Saturday or Monday had been fixed, and it is entirely a matter for the gentlemen of the bar to decide. "Some have asked about it, and some, I believe, have raised the question as to what should be the proper time."

To sit as Auditor.—Tuesday, February 24, has been fixed by District Attorney Michael E. Stroup as the first day for a hearing in the audit of the account of Curtis Lowell Fickel, administrator of the estate of Ella Fickel.

Inspector Boyer Reports.—The January monthly report of the County Commissioner of Weights and Measures Harry A. Boyer was submitted to the County Commissioners today. During the month he inspected 1,250, adjusted 179 and confiscated 234 weights and measures.

Divorce Didn't Wait Long.—During yesterday afternoon Mrs. Katherine Glantz, a Steelton woman, was granted a divorce. To-day she appeared at the marriage license bureau with Joseph Mathias, of Steelton, and got a license to wed. Mathias is a second choice, too; on November 5, 1912, Mrs. Mathias No. 1 died.

Realty Transfers.—Among yesterday's realty transfers was the sale by H. C. Wells, Sheriff, to H. Freedman, of 112 Short street, for \$611, and the latter's sale to the State Capitol Park Extension Commission in turn of the same property for \$2,200. Other properties transferred were John E. Darr, to B. B. Baskin, 1725 North street, \$1; S. P. Mentzer to R. L. Landis, 1906 Holly, \$1; C. L. Schmidt to J. F. Toles, 401 S. Young to J. A. McAllister, Susquehanna township, \$1 and \$240, respectively; B. B. Askin to John A. Dare, Steelton, \$1.

County Boys at Reformatory.—At today's session of the County Commissioners the report for 1913 of the boys incarcerated at the Huntingdon Reformatory and the cost to the county was considered. During the year there were fifty-three confined for a total of 12,995 days, costing a total of \$3,712.26. The boys were in the institution for from fourteen to 365 days.

MANY MOTORCYCLE EXHIBITS

In addition to the motorcycle shows in Chicago and New York, many other cities have this year held their own motorcycle exhibits. Some of these have been in connection with automobile shows, while others have shown the two-wheeled exclusively.

Motorcycles will form an important part of the automobile show at Grand Rapids, Mich., on February 9-14. It is expected that about forty models will be on exhibit. Under the direction of the Motorcycle Club, of St. Louis, a most successful exclusive motorcycle show was held in St. Louis recently. It is estimated that more than 4,000 persons attended. Another interesting motorcycle exhibit was that held in Cleveland in connection with the automobile show at Wigmore Coliseum.

SHOOT FOR CUP

The members of the Highspire Rod and Gun Club will hold a shoot today, on their grounds, on Green's Island, opposite Highspire, for the cup offered by the National Sportsmen's Association. The shoot will be held at 1:30, and all sportsmen are invited to attend. Only club members will be allowed to shoot for the cup.

Police Are Troubled Ones

In municipal circles the Lynch resolution which ousts every day front of the fact that the present staffs of the city treasurer, board of public works, city engineer's department and the various departments of the public safety and streets and public improvements will be retained, but several of the commissioners declared to-day that they didn't think these departments will be affected materially.

The absence of City Commissioner M. Harvey Taylor, who will not return from Philadelphia until Sunday, may prevent the introduction of the appointment resolution Tuesday. Mr. Taylor is invited to confer on the lists of employees in all departments with a view to cutting here and there, for the sake of efficiency and economy.

No legal obstacle, it is understood, will prevent the introduction of a resolution providing for new appointments at Tuesday's meeting, and if the fact of the retention of the present staff of new employees can be had in time, the names of those who are to lose their heads as well as those who will succeed them, will be announced Tuesday.

Whether or not the new license law ordinance will be offered is a question but it is probable that it will be among the new measures. Another will be Commissioner Taylor's ordinance authorizing the opening of the Cameron street extension to Wildwood park. Commissioner H. F. Bowman by the way will also offer the water departmental report for the year.

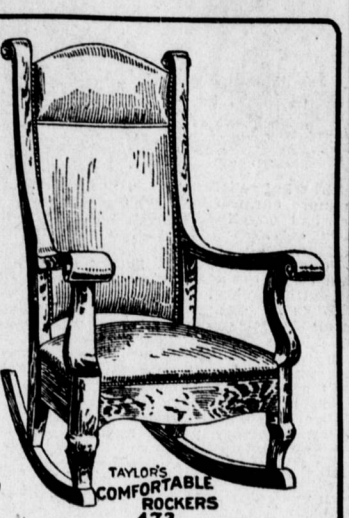
