


EXTERIOR AND INTERIOR VIEW OF "RAILROAD HOSPITAL ON WHEELS" IN YARDS AT ENOLA

"Hospital on Wheels" Goes to Accident Victims at Enola Car in Railroad Yards is Equipped to Care For Men Injured While at Their Work

Taking a victim of an accident to a hospital is not strange, but taking a hospital to the victim is a novelty. Yet this latter is done almost every time a man is injured or becomes seriously ill suddenly in the Pennsylvania yards at Enola.

In the majority of cases, when a man is injured one of the shifting engines is coupled to the hospital car and the latter is taken to the victim. The injured man is placed on a cot and the "hospital-on-wheels" takes him to the Harrisburg hospital.
