





Dillsburg, Pa., Feb. 14 .- Above is a picture of the proposed new building to be erected in Dillsburg in place of the one destroyed by fire last June. The building will be constructed of red brick trimmed with stone, and will contain eight school rooms with all necessary cloak rooms a basement in which will be the tollet rooms, furnaces and two large play rooms. As only six school rooms are needed at present time, half of the second floor will be left as a large assembly room with a seating capacity of 250 persons.
