As a result of the introduction of automatic signals at a number of points along, the main line and branches of the Pennsylvania railroad an exténsive rearrangement of op-erators and tower forces will be neces-sary. It was announced to-day that a new schedule is now being arranged by the various division operators which will become effective on or about March 1. At the offices of the Philadelphia division this morning a statement was issued to the effect that a present no definite conclusion had been reached regarding changes. There have been transfers made and some telegraphers placed on the extra list. In towers having in charge automathe signals covering from five to ten miles of tracks reduction of forces has re-sulted, but in most cases positions have been furnished the men whose services at the towers were no longer needed. On the Middle division an eleven-

services at the towers were no longer needed. On the Middle division an eleven-mile section, between Lewistown Junc-tion and Denholm, was recently placed under automatic control. As a result of this improvement three towers will be put out of service and twelve men will be effected. On this division it is said that from twenty-five to fifty men will be subject to change. At the Pennsylvania Railroad offices and along the main line telegraph op-erators in the employ of the Pennsy are anxiously awaiting orders affect-ing their future positions.


