TOWNSHIPS ARE BEING ORGANIZED

Numerous Meetings of Supervisors Will Be Held Throughout the State in March

The work of forming organizations of township supervisors in the various counties of the State is proceeding under the direction of the bureau of township highways of the State Highway Department and each week a number of new organizations are formed throughout the State. These meetings for organization are being called by the bureau of township highways in accordance with the act of July 22, 1913, and also as provided for in the act of May 8, 1913, which authorized the formation of an association of township supervisors for the construction and maintenance of public roads. Notices have been sent out for the following meetings for the first week in March:

On Monday, March 2, the Sullivan county meeting will be held at LaPorte. Joseph W. Hunter, First Deputy State Highway Commissioner, who is in charge of the bureau of township highways, will address this meeting and will outline the procedure necessary to form the organization as required by law.

The Bradford county association will be organized at Towanda on Tuesday, March 3, and Mr. Hunter will also address this meeting. On the same day the Franklin county organization will be perfected at a meeting to be held in Chambersburg, at which E. A. Jones, Second Deputy State Highway Commissioner, will deliver an address. On Wednesday, March 4, at Wellsboro, the Tioga county organization will be formed. Mr. Hunter being the State Highway Department official who will be present. Mr. Jones on the same day will be present at a meeting to be held in McConnellsburg, where the Fulton county organization will be formed, while on Friday, March 6, Mr. Jones will be present at York to assist in the formation of the county association of supervisors.

Each township supervisor of the several counties mentioned has been notified of the meeting and the law specifies that the township meeting shall be held on the first day of the month at the rate of 3 cents a mile, provided that no supervisor receives more than two days' pay in one year. In organizing the county associations there is elected a president, two vice-presidents, a secretary and treasurer, all of whom shall be members of the association, with the exception of the secretary, who may be a person not a member of the association and who may receive a salary not to exceed \$10 a year. The mayor of any city or village of any borough, or the representatives, county commissioners and county court judges are eligible to membership in the association and are permitted to hold office, but are not entitled to vote. Each county association is permitted to expend \$125 for convention purposes, which sum is obtained from the county treasurer under the provisions of the act of May 8, 1913. This sum is not available until the treasurer of the county association presents to the county treasurer a certified statement of expenditures incurred and verified by affidavit.

S. W. Jackson, assistant engineer of the State Highway Department, in charge of the district of which Sullivan county is a part, will attend the meeting, as will also J. S. Ritchey, county superintendent of Sullivan county.

While these meetings are called by the State Highway Department under the terms of the acts of Assembly, it should be understood that they are primarily intended to give the supervisors in each county all persons who are interested in the subject of good roads and highway improvement and are to constitute the first step in the formation of permanent associations in each county for the friends of the good roads movement. It is particularly urged, therefore, that all persons interested in the subject of good roads should make it a point to be at these meetings and to participate in the discussions, offering such suggestions and recommendations as they may deem fitting.

Taft Considers Resignation AS LAFAYETTE HEAD

Philadelphians Oppose Plan to Place Unitarian in Charge of Institution

Philadelphia, Feb. 24.—Ex-President William Howard Taft, professor of international law at Yale University, is being considered for the presidency of Lafayette College, to succeed the Rev. Dr. Ethelbert D. Warfield, according to the Presbyterians, the denominational organ of the Presbyterian Church in this city. The report was received yesterday with mingled sensations by Presbyterians, the majority of whom are known to be hostile to their indignation at what they called a proposal to place a Unitarian at the head of a Presbyterian college. Dr. Warfield resigned the presidency of Lafayette College a few weeks ago, presumably because of disagreements between himself and the trustees of the institution. It is reported that Dr. Warfield left Lafayette because he opposed placing the institution under the Carnegie Pension Fund, which would sever the connection between the college and the Synod of Pennsylvania.

The college was founded and endowed by Presbyterians, and is the last Presbyterian college in Pennsylvania to remain under synodical control.

Dispatches from Easton denied that the presidency had either "been offered to or sought by" the ex-President, though the original reports were simply that Mr. Taft was being "considered" for the place.

Synod Opposition Feared

According to a statement issued at the offices of the Presbyterian in the Witherspoon Building, it has heard from Easton, "apparently on the best of authority," that the presidency of Lafayette "is to be offered to William Howard Taft, ex-President of the United States and professor of international law at Yale University." The statement continues:

"Those responsible for this report are entirely correct in the statement that money has been provided to furnish a salary equal to or possibly in excess of that which Mr. Taft is receiving at Yale. The great embarrassment to the Synod is that the scheme is the opposition of the Synod of Pennsylvania, which, by the charter of the college, holds a veto power over the election of all trustees and members of the faculty."

"And it is by no means probable that the substantial Synod of Pennsylvania will consent to placing a full-fledged Unitarian at the head of its only Presbyterian college."


