Included on this committee are Samuel Snoddy, George Augst and John Ebersole. During the coming months visits will be made to the different schools of the county and their best points looked over in order that a model building may be erected here.

During the past three years the school building has been overcrowded so much that special arrangements have been necessary at different times.

At the meeting it was also decided that no class would graduate from the high school next spring. This is the first time in the history of the town that this has happened, but it is necessary because of the absence of any senior scholars in the building.


