### PENROSE GREETED UP WEST BRANCH

#### Senator Finds Plenty of People to Welcome Him and to Give Assurance of Support

#### VISITED THREE COUNTIES

#### Democratic Conditions Said to Be Very Favorable For Republican's Victory

Senator Boies Penrose received abundant assurances of support on his tour up the west branch yesterday and Northumberland, Lycoming and Clinton counties gave him hearty greetings. Last night he addressed a big meeting in Lock Haven.

A dispatch from Lock Haven says: "The Senator expressed himself as highly gratified over the warmth of his greeting in this section of the State. Two years ago there was a mighty Bull Moose sentiment here, but Senator Penrose said he had been convinced from what he had learned to-day that there had set in a steady drift back to the Republican party. He made it plain that he expects to receive a big vote in each of the three counties he had visited, including the support of a large following that went over to Colonel Roosevelt in 1912.

"Party workers with whom Mr. Penrose conferred assured him that he would carry Clinton county. It was told that in addition to the regular Republican vote he would be given substantial support from the laboring element irrespective of politics, and many Democrats who are dissatisfied with industrial and business conditions, for which the Democratic tariff law is blamed. Senator Penrose was informed that the employees of plants in this section were eagerly awaiting an opportunity to vote for the return of the Republican party to control of public affairs.

"An indication of political sentiment is disclosed by the fact that the Penrose nomination petitions contain the names of hundreds of laboring men. Traces of the Ryan-McCormick Democratic defeat clearly are apparent throughout this section. Among Senator Penrose's callers to-day were many Democrats, who will vote for him because of their opposition to the candidacies of McCormick and A. Mitchell Palmer. Since the recent visit to Lock Haven of McCormick, the supporters of Michael J. Ryan have been very active. They confidently predict that Ryan will carry Clinton county. And only slight interest is shown in the candidacy of Gifford Pinchot. The Republicans are enthusiastic over Martin G. Brumbaugh and he will be supported by a large element of the Bull Moose party.

### Mother Heroine Bails Water Five Days to Save Baby

New York, March 26.—Women of New York are talking of applying to the Carnegie Hero Commission for a medal for Mrs. Oscar Johnson, whose heroism inspired the crew of her husband's schooner, the Laura M. Lunt, to superhuman efforts during the nineteen days that the ships was tossing about in a leaky condition after having been blown 300 miles off her course, which lay between Norfolk and Jacksonville. Captain and Mrs. Johnson and their 4-year-old daughter, Helmar, with the crew of three, were rescued 200 miles north of Cuba by the British steamer Windmere, as the ship was rapidly filling with water. In describing the heroism of his wife, the captain said: "Mrs. Johnson baled water out of the cabin with a leaky pail for five days and nights without help. She would not permit the men to leave the pumps, because she knew that her love for our baby would sustain her in the fight to save the little one from drowning. All the time the water was swashing about the floor of the cabin. Our child was tucked safely in my berth."

### BROTHER AND SISTER IN HARRISBURG HOSPITAL

Elsie Carnathan, 10-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John F. Carnathan, 2315 Jefferson street, was brought to the Harrisburg Hospital last evening suffering with typhoid fever. Several hours later her 13-year-old brother was brought to the hospital suffering with appendicitis. Both will be operated upon this afternoon.

### Budget, Millage and Licenses Ordinances to Be Passed Tomorrow

City Council to-morrow afternoon will pass finally, it is expected, the 1914 budget, millage and license ordinances without change. The session will begin at 3 o'clock. The police captain measure introduced on Tuesday will not be read finally because the necessary interval between first and final readings has not passed. Council will likely hear the communication of the combined West Harrisburg organizations relative to the establishment of a subway at Division street.

### MONOPOLY IS CHARGED

Washington, D. C., March 26.—Charges that the American Sugar Refining Company has for twenty-three years monopolized the New Orleans sugar market by a "ruthless extermination of competition" and has depressed the price of raw sugar there fully \$2,000,000 to the distress of the planters, were presented to President Wilson.

### Report of Destruction of Steamer and Loss of Many Lives Discredited

Honolulu, March 26.—Reports of the destruction of the Inter-Island steamer Maui with the loss of many lives was said to-day to be untrue. A search of several hours failed to discover any wreckage of the steamer which was said to have blown up off Pearl harbor last night. It is now believed that the vessel will report safely later.

Representatives of the Inter-Island Steam Navigation Company, owner of the Maui, discredited the statement of soldiers at Fort Kamehameha that they saw the ship blow up and sink. The Maui left this port yesterday carrying a large quantity of explosives. When the report of the ship's destruction was received every available tug and launch including the naval tug Intrepid put to sea.

The Maui had aboard about forty men including the crew and a number of Hawaiian laborers.

### To Call John Thomas For Sentence Monday; Guilty of Manslaughter

John Thomas, the negro waiter who pleaded guilty last week to a charge of manslaughter, will be arraigned for sentence before President Judge Kunkel on Monday morning.

### Gossip About Division Changes Is Denied

The old story about a change of divisions on the Pennsylvania railroad system has been revived. In railroad circles to-day it was the general gossip that with the introduction of the summer schedules the changes would be announced. The reports were denied to-day at official headquarters in Altoona and in Harrisburg.

### Freight Is Moving in Strike District

Pittsburgh, Pa., March 26.—With the arrival here to-day of 225 experted trainmen, freight began to move more freely on the Monongahela division of the Pennsylvania railroad, tied up since last Saturday by a strike of yard crews.

### DIDN'T SEE HAWLEY

H. B. Sheeley, recording secretary of lodge No. 673, Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen to-day said that the Telegraph was in error when it announced in its issue of March 18 that Samuel M. Hertzler, a special duty engineer on the Middle division of the Pennsylvania Railroad had been in conference with A. H. Hawley, financial secretary and treasurer of this brotherhood during a recent visit to Peoria, Ill., where the national headquarters of the lodge are located.

Mr. Airich is favorably known as a speaker to men, as well as a Bible teacher, and his coming appearance at the "Pleasant Sunday Afternoon" has attracted a great deal of attention. The meeting will be held in Lenney's Theater, 6 South Thirteenth street, at 3.45, with the preliminary song service at 3.30. President E. F. Weaver will conduct the meeting.

### STUDENT CABINET TO GOVERN ACADEMY

#### Members Chosen From Upper Forms to Act Under Direction of Headmaster

The pupils of the Harrisburg academy by almost unanimous vote adopted yesterday a constitution providing for a "Student Cabinet."

Its purpose shall be to aid in maintaining a high standard of deportment and scholarship; to promote, foster and cultivate desirable school traditions in accordance with the best sentiment of the students and the policy of the headmaster.

The members of the cabinet consists of the president and vice-president of the sixth form, the president and vice-president of the fifth form, the captain of the Greek club, the captain of the Roman club, the editor-in-chief of the Spectator, and two members at large chosen from the fifth or sixth form. The members at large shall be elected by members of

a majority vote of the school one month after the opening of school. The functions of the cabinet shall be: To award the school "letter" or other insignia to members of the respective teams; to provide for the entertainment of visiting teams; to regulate the conduct of members of the school on trips; to choose managers and assistant managers of the respective teams subject to approval of headmaster; to aid and have full power to co-operate with the headmaster in any matter which concerns the welfare of the academy. One of the provisions of the constitution is that no measure shall be put into effect without the sanction of the headmaster. The adoption of this constitution by the students of the Academy is significant and indicates the growth of a splendid spirit of co-operation in the onward movement at the Academy. There is an increasingly strong sentiment among the pupils to advance the standard of conduct and scholarship of which this recent action is evidence.
