William Edward, an aged man who was in the bathroom of his home, was overcome with smoke. The men of the night crew of Burnham rushed into the house and saved him from the flames. The loss is \$6,000. Several bystanders received bruises when the trucks collided. The Brooklyn driver was blinded by the light, which caused the run-in.
