**Publish Daily to Tell Campaign News**

Three years ago the Young Men's Christian Association of Scottsdale, Pa., a town of about 5,000 population, raised \$50,000 for the purpose of erecting a new Y. M. C. A. building. The committee decided to erect a better building than originally intended and this week put on another campaign for \$12,000 additional. This campaign was conducted by E. J. Hockenbury, of Harrisburg, field secretary of the State Young Men's Christian Association, with offices in the Calder Building, and was intended to run for six days. At the end of the fourth day the committee had raised \$16,250 and
