Auditor General's Department, and Harry S. McDevitt, Philadelphia, now statistician of the State Board of Public Charities and former assistant executive controller, were selected. Mr. Soffel is to look after the work from the standpoint of a businessman with large interests, and Messrs. McDevitt and Jones, who are familiar with every department on Capitol Hill and outside bureaus, will furnish the expert information and co-operate with Mr. Soffel in working out any new system which may be required.

The commissioners are to receive \$3,000 each per year and will have authority to employ such clerical and expert assistance as they may need. As the report is to be made to the next Legislature, it is expected that the \$10,000 made available by the recent appropriation will suffice, the Auditor
