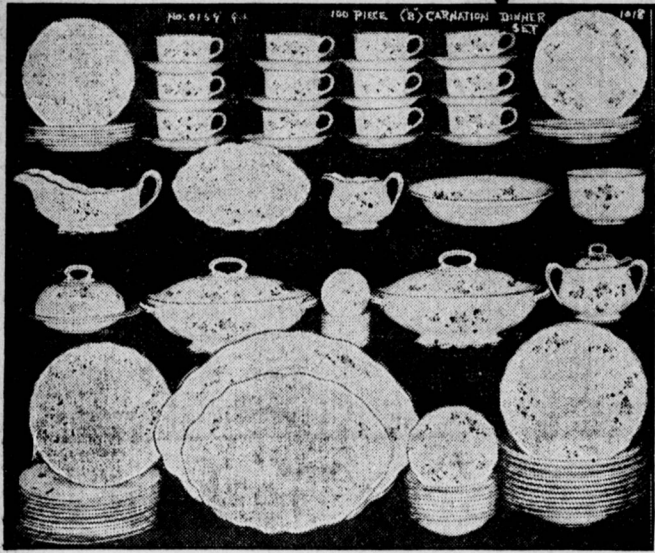

Winning from Princeton over Yale in the annual debate John McIlhenny Smith, class 1915, scored great honors. He took the negative side of the suffrage question.

"The affirmative must prove that woman suffrage has resulted in a pronounced uplift of sociological and political conditions in the nine full suffrage States. In maintaining that woman has not had an uplifting influence the speaker took up in a woman's attitude towards the liquor question, the union of church and State, their relation with legislation and politics and the indifferent and disinterested vote which is sure to be the result of extending suffrage in the south and east.
