### Pastor of Sunbury Church Is Delegate to General Synod of United States

Sunbury, Pa., April 2.—The Rev. Robert O'Boyle, of the First Reformed Church, has been elected a delegate to the eighteenth triennial session of the General Synod of the Reformed Church in the United States, which will be held at Lancaster, Pa., starting May 12.

The synod represents a confirmed and unconfirmed membership of 431,000 persons. At the meeting of the synod 60 classes, 1,193 ministers, 1,756 congregations, 1,726 Sunday schools, 27,530 Sunday school officers and teachers, 228,844 Sunday school students and 26 students for the ministry will be represented.

The golden jubilee of the synod's organization will be celebrated and the three hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the Heidelberg catechism will be observed.

This year the Synod of the Susquehanna Classis, comprising thirty-four eastern counties' churches, was held in Pastor O'Boyle's church and more than 200 preachers were in attendance.

### OLDEST RAFTSMAN ON RIVER IS DEAD

Captain Frederick Waller Piloted More Than 2,000 Rafts and Boats Down Susquehanna

Marietta, Pa., April 2.—Captain Frederick Waller, 80 years old, died suddenly yesterday morning from heart disease. He had been in failing health for about a year, but was not considered dangerously ill. He was born in Marietta and at the age of 15 was the first raft down the Susquehanna river to the Chesapeake and during his time piloted more than 2,000 of them. He ran the only steamboat without oars, using rudders, from Lock Haven to Port Deposit, at the age of 30. He cast his first vote for President Buchanan and ever since voted the Democratic ticket, served in the Marietta school board for twenty-four years, was a past officer of the Odd Fellows, Knights of Pythias and was the oldest Mason in this section of the state. His father, John Waller, was the first man buried in the Marietta Cemetery. Mr. Waller piloted the last raft down the Susquehanna river before the McCall dam was built, a number of years ago. He was twice married. His second wife, one daughter and one son survive.

### SMALLPOX VICTIMS OUT OF QUARANTINE

Epidemic in Lancaster County Said to Be Over; 500 Vaccinated

Marietta, Pa., April 2.—Dr. J. L. Mowery, of Lancaster, State medical inspector for Lancaster county, reported yesterday that the smallpox situation at Bainbridge and Billmyer is well under control, two cases having been released, and before long the balance will be out of quarantine. There were seven patients released in Bainbridge, which was the total number there, and two at Billmyer. The Timberlake family, where the disease originated, are free and none of the worse for the experience. More than five hundred persons of all nationalities were vaccinated by the State medical authorities, and with the exception of about ten cases all were effective, and many of the foreigners cannot understand the "sore arm" which they are going through. The next trip the medical inspector takes to this locality will be to release everyone and declare the "sore" over.
