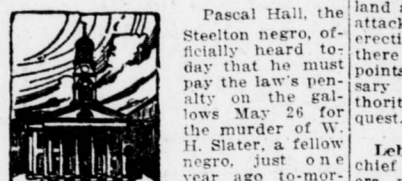

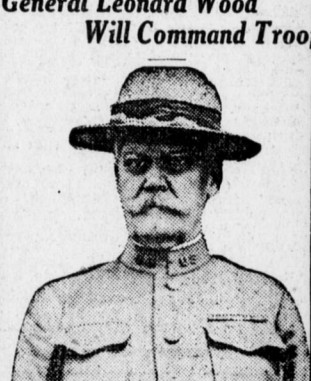
Morro Castle Enroute South; Cruisers Being Made Ready For Sea

Will Decide Whether Guards May Leave U. S.

Washington, D. C., April 24.—Proceedings were begun in the Supreme Court to-day to determine whether the National Guard may be sent to Mexico or other territory outside the United States without first being mustered in as volunteers. The proceedings are in the nature of an appeal from the action of Judge Day, in the Federal Court in Northern Ohio, in dismissing an action of Lieutenant-Colonel Daniel T. Stears against Adjutant General George H. Wood, of the Ohio National Guard, growing out of preparations for militia movements outside the country.
