

### Newcomb Wins in Championship Shot

Philadelphia, April 30.—Displaying excellent form, Charles H. Newcomb yesterday carried off all the honors in the seventh annual registered shoot of the Keystone Shooting League, over the Holmesburg traps.

Not alone was Newcomb high amateur gun on the day's program of 173 targets, with the good score of 171, but he captured the Pennsylvania State championship by a score of 97 out of 100. Added to this, he is among the leaders in the first half of the Keystone Shooting League handicap, with 47 breaks.

As showing the speed of the shooters, German ran 108 targets before he missed; W. A. Brown broke 78 consecutive birds; Newcomb, 69; Hellyer, 68, and Hell, 61. Other particularly noteworthy performances were Vincent Oliver, with 164; John Philip Souss, with 163, and Powers, with a similar total.


