STEELTON STEELTON FLIES TO HAVE NO MERRY TIME

Town to Be Plastered With Posters Urging Slaughter of the Insects

Plans for the annual fly "swatting" campaign will be formulated at a meeting of the executive committee of the Steelton Civic Club, at the home of Mrs. J. M. Heagy, South Front street, Monday afternoon. It is the aim of the Civic Club members to make this year's war against the fly more vigorous than ever before. The usual casual private to the boy or girl who "swats" the greatest number of flies will likely be offered. Large red and black window posters telling of the dangerousness of the fly will be distributed about the town and other strenuous measures to rid the town of the pesky fly will be resorted to. An innovation in the anti-fly crusade will be the placing of a large number of traps at various places along the streets of the borough. The Civic Club has considered the advisability of placing these traps about town for several months. In a number of western cities this plan of exterminating the fly has been successfully tried and it is believed that it would work well here. The traps used are a large wire affair holding about a bushel of flies. The traps are baited with tasty articles of food, such as bananas, bread and sugar. Forty per cent of the traps are of emptying the traps, is done by the fly. It is up to the highway department employees to see that the traps are cleaned.

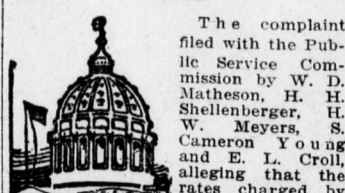

MIDDLETOWN LOST WATER RATE CASE

Public Service Commissioners Dismiss the Complaint About the Charges



The complaint filed with the Public Service Commission by W. D. Matheson, H. H. Shellenberger, H. W. Meyers, S. Cameron Young and E. L. Croil, alleging that the rates charged by the Middletown and Swatara Consolidated Water Company are unjust, unreasonable and discriminatory, was dismissed by the commission to-day. It was shown that the charges and expenses incurred by the company for the year ending October 1, 1913, amounted to \$7,833.29, leaving the sum of \$7,806.62 net revenue against the new water rates complained against.

The commission held that without taking into consideration the subjects of sinking fund or depreciation, it appears that the company is not receiving a net revenue equal to the value of its plant, nor an income more than is fairly due after deducting the proper charges and necessary expenses incident to the conduct of its business.

C. S. Sims, second vice-president of the Delaware & Hudson company, has asked if the commission has ruled that it will be legal for railroad companies to issue transportation to its surgeons, local attorneys and watch inspectors. He has been advised by W. N. Trinkle, counsel for the commission, that if the persons referred to be bona fide employees under a continuing contract of hire they may be accorded free transportation, but, that supplies to the various State depart-

ments for the coming fiscal year.

Coal Companies Unite.

Fourteen coal companies have filed statements in the Dauphin County Court joining in the People's Coal Company, of Scranton, in the test of the constitutionality of the anthracite coal tax act of 1913 and which unite with it in any further steps which may be taken. The case was argued in the Dauphin County Court in March, but no decision has been given as yet. The companies joining with the original plaintiff are the Pennsylvania, Scranton, Hillside Coal and Iron, West End, Hudson, Price Hancock, Delaware, Lackawanna and Western, Enterprise, Green Ridge, Sterrick, Northwestern, Lackawanna, Forty Fort and Mount Lookout Coal Companies.

11 Jurors Declare 4 Fingers Worth \$1,800

Less than an hour after the Federal jury retired this morning to deliberate over the question of damages due Joseph Vreck, a Steelton Austrian, one of the jurors, George S. Davis, an aged banker of Sellersville, was called in and the juror was removed from the hotel. Philip S. Moyer, counsel for Vreck, agreed with the Steelton company's counsel to permit the eleven remaining jurors to return a verdict of \$1,800.

Vreck, who is not yet naturalized, and therefore under the jurisdiction of some machinery while working at the steel company plant, and four of his fingers were crushed.
