Everything that flares to produce a wide effect in the skirt is fashionable. This one is made with two circular flounces. It is very simple and very smart and it can be treated in a number of different ways. As shown here, it is all of one material but the flounces could be made of plaid or other fancy material while the skirt is plain, or, if the material is heavy and it is desirable to reduce the weight, thin silk can be used for the skirt beneath the flounces while the lower portion only is of the material. The model is a good one for all seasonable materials. The heavier ones will require only to be stitched on the edges, the lighter ones, such as taffeta and other silks, can be finished with little plaitings of ribbon or narrow ruchings of the materials.
