Five trustees of the Pennsylvania State Hospital for the Insane in this city were named last night by Governor Tener, together with twenty-three other appointments to commissions and boards.

The trustees named for Harrisburg were W. H. Scharitz, the Altoona editor; William Coleman Freeman, former legislator, Cornwall; and John F. Mentzer, Ephrata; and Dr. Henry M. Stine and D. C. Herr, Harrisburg.

Grand Commandery of Knights of Malta Lowers Per Capita Tax For Year

Special to The Telegraph York, Pa., May 14.—Pennsylvania Grand Commandery, Knights of Malta, placed the per capita tax for the ensuing year at 30 cents at yesterday's session.

Pottsville was selected for next year's session, and James L. Penney, Jr., of Commandery No. 145, McKeesport, was chosen grand sentinel. A reduction of two cents in the per capita tax was recommended by the finance committee after an effort had been made to decrease it from 32 cents to 25 cents.

Supreme Commander M. A. Conder, of Allentown, made an address in which he complimented the Pennsylvania grand commandery for its remarkable growth and healthy condition.

Past Commander Herman B. Furlong presented the grand commandery with a gavel made from a railroad tie laid in Panama in 1852.

Public memorial services were conducted at noon in memory of thirty-two members of the grand commandery who died last year. The Rev. C. S. Miller, of Mt. Carmel, grand prelate, presided and delivered the oration.

A total of \$51,192.39 was distributed among dependent companions and widows last year.

Two public processions were held last night. One was in connection with the ceremonial session of the Prince of Baghdad, No. 77, a side degree of the order, and the other in connection with the annual meeting of the College of Ancients.

Pottsville.—Because Council of Frackville declined to increase the salary of the secretary of the board of health, three members of the board resigned.

Bloomsburg.—Harry Martenis, 8 years old, son of Mr. and Mrs. Chester Martenis, was injured Tuesday night by lightning striking a tree near which he stood. His condition is serious.

Williamsport.—John D. Allison was seriously injured when a safe weighing 1,200 pounds fell on him at Roaring Branch.

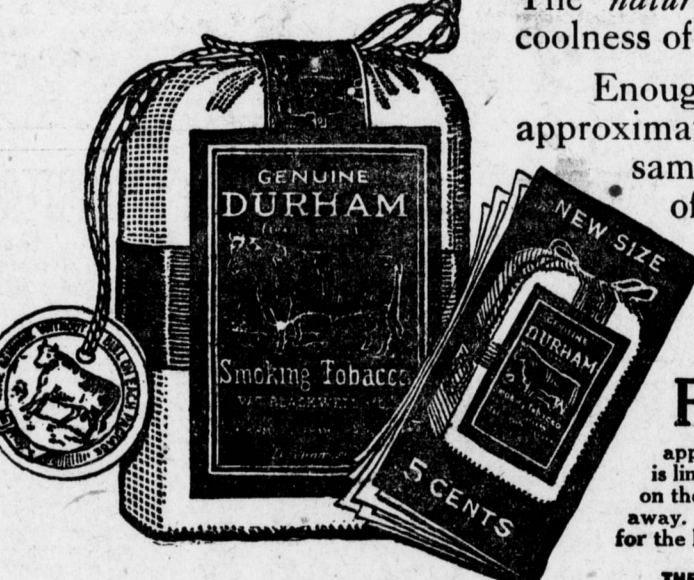

School Board to Talk on Bond Issue and the City Health Regulations

In addition to approving the award of the contract for the sale of the \$90,000 worth of Allison Hill grade school bonds, the school board at its meeting to-morrow evening will also discuss the results of the directors conference last evening with the bureau of health and sanitation.

Whether anything definite will be decided upon, President Harry A. Boyer, of the school board, was unable to say last evening. The school authorities, he said, are anxious in every way possible to aid the health bureau in maintaining the health of the city.

The conference was for the purpose of discussing the quarantine regulations in the schools and the proper observance of precautionary measures. A plan suggested was that a system of cards be established whereby the dates, time of quarantine necessary, and other data can be distributed among the children; thus the length of quarantine could be definitely established and an accurate card index system of these facts, kept. The consensus of opinion appeared to be that twenty-one days is too lengthy a time in which to insist upon quarantine for the milder cases.

Street Sinking Into Mine Splits Mahanoy City Houses

Special to The Telegraph Mahanoy City, Pa., May 14.—Men putting down a new roadbed through the west end of this city for the Schuylkill Railway Company found that the surface had subsided seven feet into the mine working of the Tunnel Ridge Colliery. Large brick buildings along the thoroughfare have been split from roof to foundation, and sewers and water mains displaced. Council is preparing to take action against the removing of coal pillars. Street paving in that section has been abandoned.
