

TECH TRACK TEAM WINS ANOTHER MEET

Give Gettysburg a Big Surprise; Bring Home Silver Trophy

Winning the dual track meet from Gettysburg College freshmen on Saturday, Technical high school added another silver cup to the many trophies won this season. Tech's score was 65. Gettysburg had 61 points. The result was a great surprise to Gettysburg athletes. Tech had several second team men in their events who helped in landing the honors. The cup was presented by the Harrisburg alumni of Gettysburg College. Tech's team has not lost a meet this year. 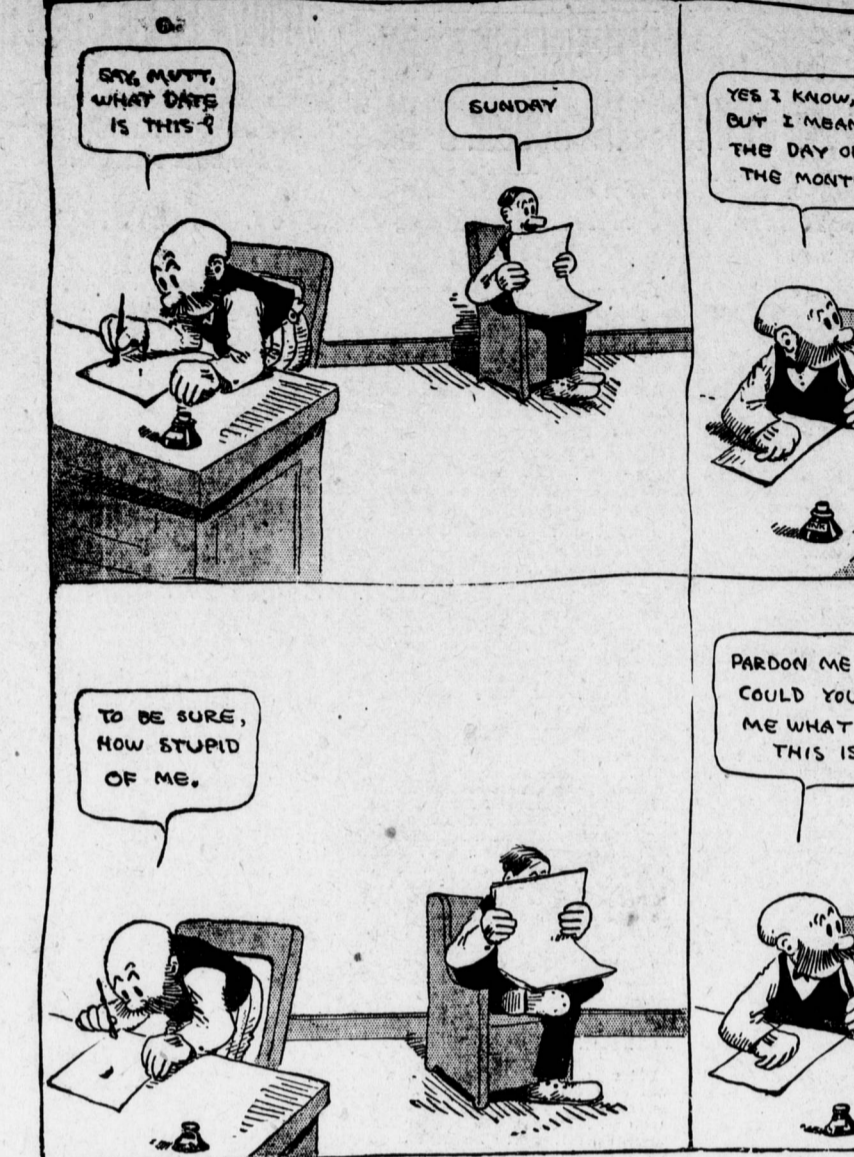

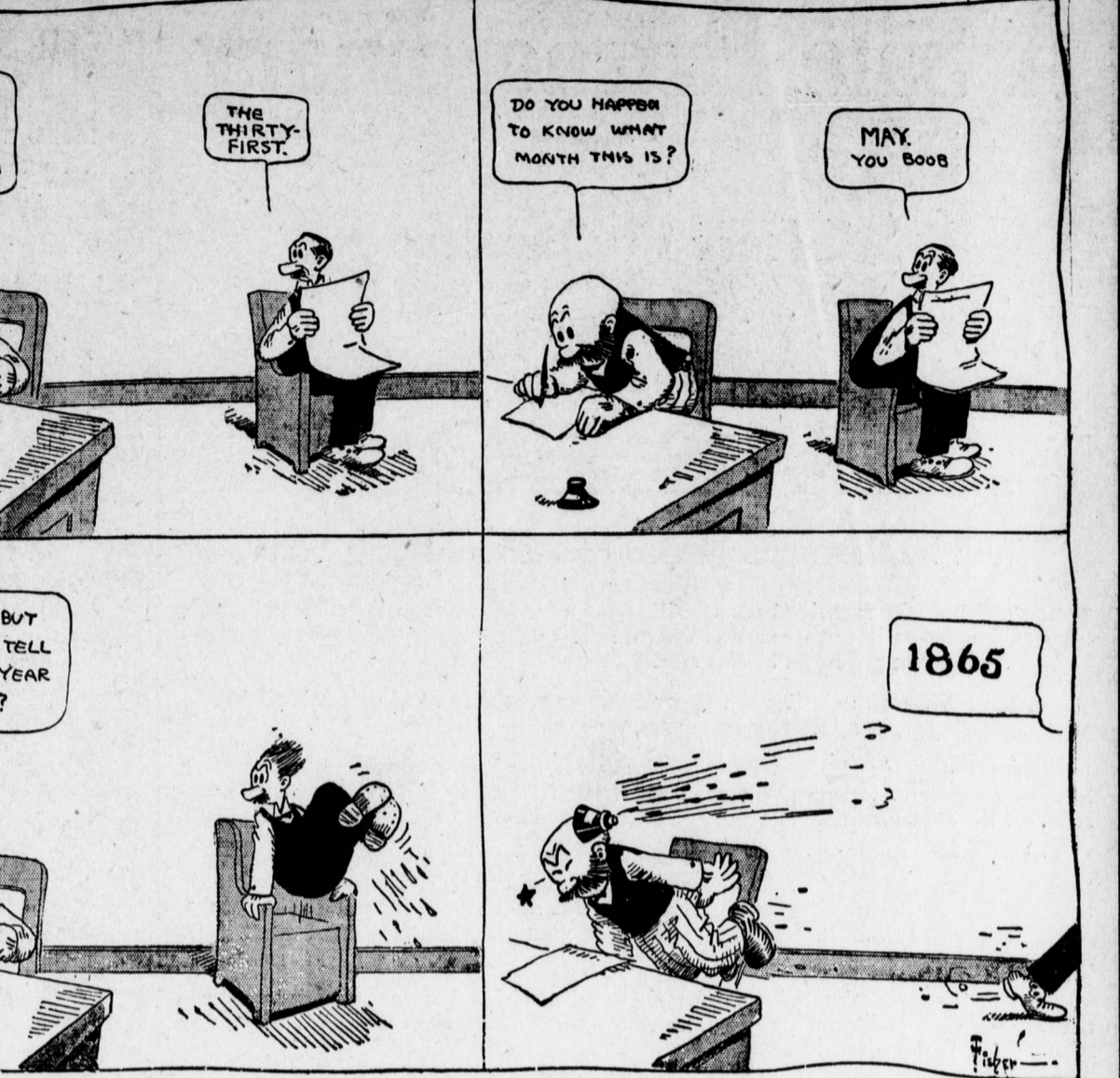
