ZION CHURCH CHOIR SINGS OLD ORATORIO

Selections From "The Messiah" Given With Brilliance and Rare Finish

The auditorium of Zion Lutheran Church was filled last evening for the production of selections from Handel's "Messiah." Zion Church choir has always maintained a high standard of music and its renditions have been noteworthy on more than one occasion, but never more so than last night. The choir was assisted by the Undergrove orchestra, fairly outdid itself in difficult choruses, which were sung with a spirit and attack quite remarkable, showing most careful preparation on the part of Professor E. J. Decevee, the choir-master. Especially well sung were the choruses "Lift Up Your Heads," "All We Like Sheep" and the great "Hallelujah" chorus. The soloists were all in splendid voice. Mr. Lutz sang with richness and power the aria, "For Behold, Darkness Shall Cover the Earth." Miss Bennett sang with intelligence and fine feeling "He Was Despised." Sherman Allen's sympathetic tenor voice was heard to advantage in "But Thou Didst Not Leave His Soul in Hell." He sang with rare expression "Behold and See." Mrs. E. J. Decevee was never in better voice and this well-known aria was most artistic in her rendition of the pretentious aria, "Know That My Redeemer Liveth," which was sung with rare good taste and fine phrasing. The organ and orchestral accompaniments were effective and added much to the enjoyment of the work.
