pastor Derry Presbyterian church, delivered the address of welcome; responses were delivered by the Rev. William F. Klein, president Berks County Union; George Miller, president Lebanon County Union; Norman W. Kines, president Perry County Union; and Charles W. Black, president Dauphin County Union.

One minute testimonial on the topic, "What Has Christian Endeavor Done For Me?" was discussed by many endeavorers.

President Charles W. Black, of Dauphin county Union, then gave the annual report at the Dauphin county business session. He said in part:

"During the year of service I have had the great pleasure of meeting with forty-eight Christian Endeavor societies and witnessing their inspiring meetings. There were fifteen Christian Endeavor rallies held in various parts of the county. The Harrisburg City Convention of the largest in the history of Christian Endeavor work when nearly 2,000 gathered in Bethlehem Lutheran Church during Endeavor week.

Mr. Black's report shows the number of societies in the various churches as follows: Baptist, three societies reporting a membership of 161; Church of God, eleven societies reporting a membership of 491; Evangelical, seven societies reporting a membership of 379; Lutheran, thirteen societies reporting a membership of 656; A. M. E. Zion, reporting a membership of 40; Presbyterian, nine societies reporting a membership of 494; Reformed, seven societies reporting a membership of 331; United Brethren, nineteen societies reporting a membership of 1,448; Church of Christ, reporting one society with a membership of 30; Wormleysburg U. B., a membership of 46; Lutheran, Zion, Enola, 28; making a total of 73 Senior societies reporting a membership of 4,106.

Baptists, reporting two unions, a membership of 52 members; Church of God, ten societies, reporting a membership of 562 members; Evangelical, three societies, reporting a membership of 258; Lutheran, nine societies reporting a membership of 571; Presbyterian, six societies, reporting a membership of 304; Reformed, three societies, reporting a membership of 113; United Brethren, seventeen societies, reporting a membership of 1,283; Methodist (col.) Harrisburg, A. M. E. Zion, 15 members; United Brethren, Wormleysburg, total for the Juniors, 3,198. There are six intermediate societies in the county with 188 members. Senior total, 73 societies, 4,106 members; intermediate total, six societies, 188 members; Junior total, 52 societies, 3,198 members; grand total, 7,492. Of 177 societies in the county 131 reported and 46 did not report.
