FIFTY BODIES FOUND IN TUNNEL Hillcrest, Alberta, June 22.—Discovery by rescuers of fifty bodies lying in one of the tunnels of mine No. 20 of the Hillcrest collieries, Limited, to-day brought up to 181 the total of recovered dead at the mine which was wrecked by an explosion Friday. Eighty grave diggers worked all day in the little mountainside cemetery just outside of the village and by night it is expected the greater part of the former male population of the mining colony will be resting there.

Washington, June 22.—Hundreds of persons were attracted to Meadowlands, near here, to-day by the spectacle of a burning oil tank, while fifty men, under Frank McCue, superintendent of the United Coal company, fought to save the cabins of a score or more miners from the flames.
