## BEARS SEARCHING FOR WEAK SPOTS TO-DAY

B. & O. and Louisville and Nashville Lost Point While New Haven Was Feverish; Some Neglected

New York, July 13.—The course of the market suggested that the bears were searching for weak spots in their efforts to depress the general list. Canadian Pacific, the most active stock fell 3/4 points on combined selling by Canadian houses and the short interest. Baltimore and Ohio and Louisville and Nashville lost a point or more under similar pressure, while New Haven was feverish, declining to its recent low level. Obscure stocks were temporarily neglected while the leaders, including Harrimans, Hills, Anthracite and Steel, were on firm ground. Bonds were heavy with weakness in Western Maryland and New York. West Chester and Boston 4 1/2s, the latter a New Haven subsidiary. These issues fell 3/4 and 5/8 points, respectively.

Says the Next Olympic Will Be the Greatest

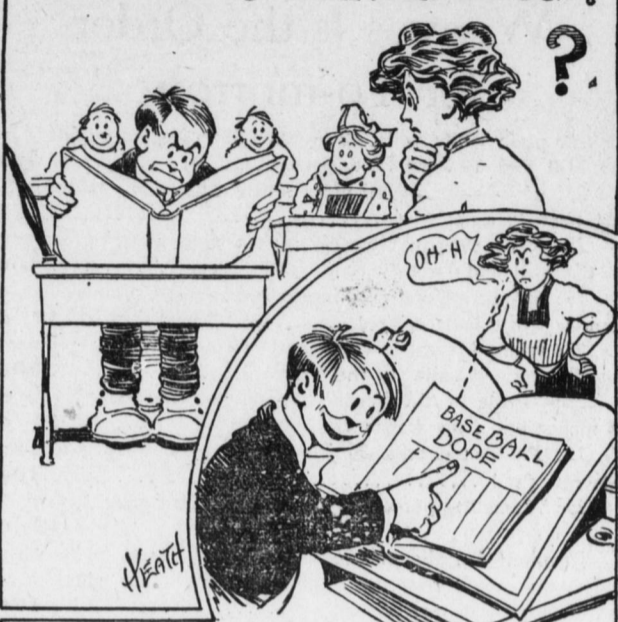
Colonel R. M. Thompson

New York, July 13.—Colonel R. M. Thompson, president of the American Olympic committee, returned from Paris July 3, on the Mauretania. He was a delegate to the congress which sat in Paris from June 13 to June 23 to arrange rules for the Olympiad next year in Berlin.
