New York, July 17. - Further weakness in shares of Eastern trunk lines, including Kinross, New York Central and Erie, gave rise to unconfirmed rumors that certain traders had advanced Northern the matter of the Eastern freight rate decision, now impending. Harriman's were almost the only strong railway issues. There were more sales of Baltimore and Ohio, Pfd., for future delivery, obviously of foreign origin. The market for the same sort was recorded in connection with Lake Shore, Atchison, New Haven and Erie bonds. Industrials were relatively steady, despite some pressure against Steel. The general bond list was irregular.
