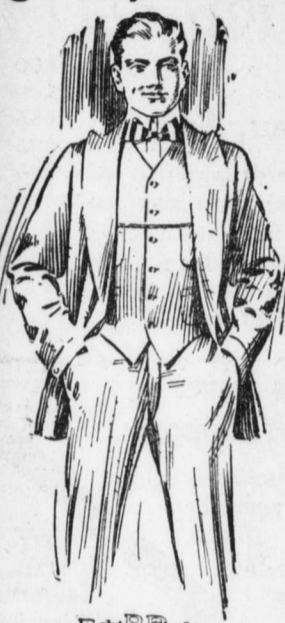

The commission has been advised legally that it has all of the powers and duties of a legislative commission and that it has the right to enter proceedings for contempt.

London, July 17.—Commenting upon the resignation of President Huerta, the morning papers give credit to President Wilson for the success of his policy, but consider that the Mexican imbroglio is in no way solved.

New Government Will Be Short Lived He Says

Havana, July 17.—The former Mexican minister of commerce, Querido Moreno, prior to his departure west, said Huerta's resignation was no surprise to him and expressed the belief that a constitutional government would be short lived.

Diaz Makes No Comment of Huerta's Retirement

Paris, July 17.—General Porfirio Diaz, ex-President of Mexico, was in the city today in preparation for his departure for Biarritz for the summer season when the news came that Provisional President Huerta had decided to resign.

Carranza Says He Will Not Recognize Old Debts

Monterey, Mex., July 17.—"General Carranza will not recognize the validity of the debts of Huerta after he enters Mexico City and establishes a constitutional government," was the statement made here yesterday by high constitutionalist officials.

Mexico City, July 17.—Ricardo Gomez Robelo, attorney general of the republic, has resigned.

Three Factions Engage in Fight at Acapulco

Washington, D. C., July 17.—The United States continued to-day to exert its influence with General Carranza to bring about an immediate general amnesty for the forces which fought against the northern armies.
