

Weddings, baptisms and even funerals for Catholics either must be held without the customary religious services or else those services can be obtained only after unusual difficulty.

The Catholics are awaiting the out-come of an appeal to General Car-ranza to change the situation. Soon after the occupation of Nuevo Laredo by the Constitutionalists under Major Sato he ordered the occupation of the Catholic church. The priest, Father Eglesias, was deported to the American side. The church since has been used as a barracks and civilians have been refused permission to enter. Women of prominent families re-cently petitioned Colonel Murieta, Con-stitutionalist commander, to give the church to the public for a primary school. Murieta answered he would not permit the building to be used for any purpose other than as a barracks, nor will the priest be permitted to re-turn to Nuevo Laredo. Catholic residents are without re-ligious services and the only clerical services they can obtain are those of priests from the American side of the river.
