Borough Head Opens Chautauqua Program

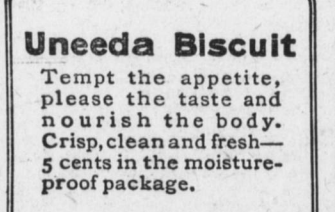

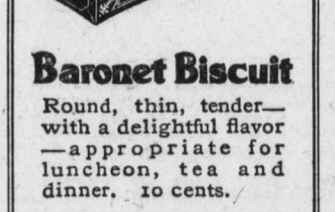

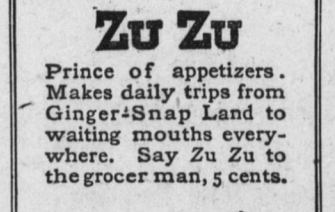
