FAMOUS TROTTER DEAD Reading, Pa., July 23.—Ashland, Wilkes, by Red Wilkes, dam Daisy B., for many years holding the distinction of being the leading sire in America, was found dead in his stall yesterday the Hillside stock farm. He far out-lived the sires of light harness horses which were prominent in this country a quarter century ago. Ashland Wilkes was foaled in 1882 and was purchased by W. Harry Orr in 1892. The animal sired 185 stand-ard performers, eleven of them having marks from 2.10 down to 2.01½. Some of the greatest horses sired by Ashland Wilkes were John R.
