Business Concerns Show Their Activities on Floats to Big Old Home Week Crowds

FIREMEN'S DAY TOMORROW

20,000 People Expected to Attend "Big Day" of the Celebration

By a Staff Correspondent. Chambersburg, Pa., July 29.—The Queen City of the Cumberland Valley was to-day the hostess for countless hundreds who came here to see the great industrial parade and enjoy the various events of the Old Home Week celebration.

From early morning until noon the crowds were arriving and it is estimated that one of the largest crowds ever attending a celebration in the Cumberland Valley is here. The parade was the greatest of its kind ever seen in this vicinity and the hundreds of float and fire floats made one of the most interesting processions to be found anywhere.

Floats Attract Attention. One of the floats which attracted much attention was that of the Wolf Company, manufacturers of flour mill and other machinery. A completely equipped flour mill occupied the big float and flour was manufactured on board.

C. V. R. R. Big Feature. A good-sized portion of the parade was taken up by the Cumberland Valley Railroad Company. Employees of the concern on the road and in the shops paraded in a body, each man carrying a cane.

Yesterday's parade drew an exceptionally large crowd here and secret orders were sent to many parts of the valley. The floats were decorated in an attractive manner and received much comment.

Last evening an interesting session of the carnival committee was held in the offices of R. H. Overpeck, manager of the Bell Telephone Company here. Final plans for the big affair on Friday evening were gone over.

T. M. JONES GETS HONORABLE DISCHARGE

Interesting History of Bill That Makes Him State's Youngest Soldier

Special to The Telegraph. Washington, D. C., July 28.—The military record of Colonel Thomas M. Jones, an old-time Harrisburg newspaper correspondent, in connection with a bill favorably reported yesterday by the House military committee, it appears that Jones went to war at the age of 12, and acted as a drummer boy from September 18, 1862, to the following April when his father compelled him to return home.

Mr. Jones served in the Union army as a member of one of three unattached independent companies from Pennsylvania, being a drummer in Company C, Independent Regiment, recruited in Warren, Pa., and commanded by Captain DeWitt C. James, a son of the famous General Joseph James, of Warren.

Mr. Jones enlistered the interest of Congressman Mitchell, both personal friends, in the bill, and Mr. Kramer had two allies who gave him very material assistance.

COUNCIL TO TAKE FREQUENT INSPECTION TRIPS OVER TOWN

Commission Believes It Can Thus See What's to Be Done Better

City Council will take little auto trips of inspection about town every couple of weeks or so. The commissioners decided this morning following a trip to Summit and Market streets to look over the grading problem, up town to inspect a small side street which is to be paved, and then out to the proposed new formal entrance to Reservoir Park at Twenty-first and Market streets.

One provides for the grading of Mt. Pleasant street from Evergreen to Summit; the other calls for the closing of Summit street to traffic at the cliff and construct a series of steps for pedestrians from the bluff to the remaining portion of Summit street below the bluff.

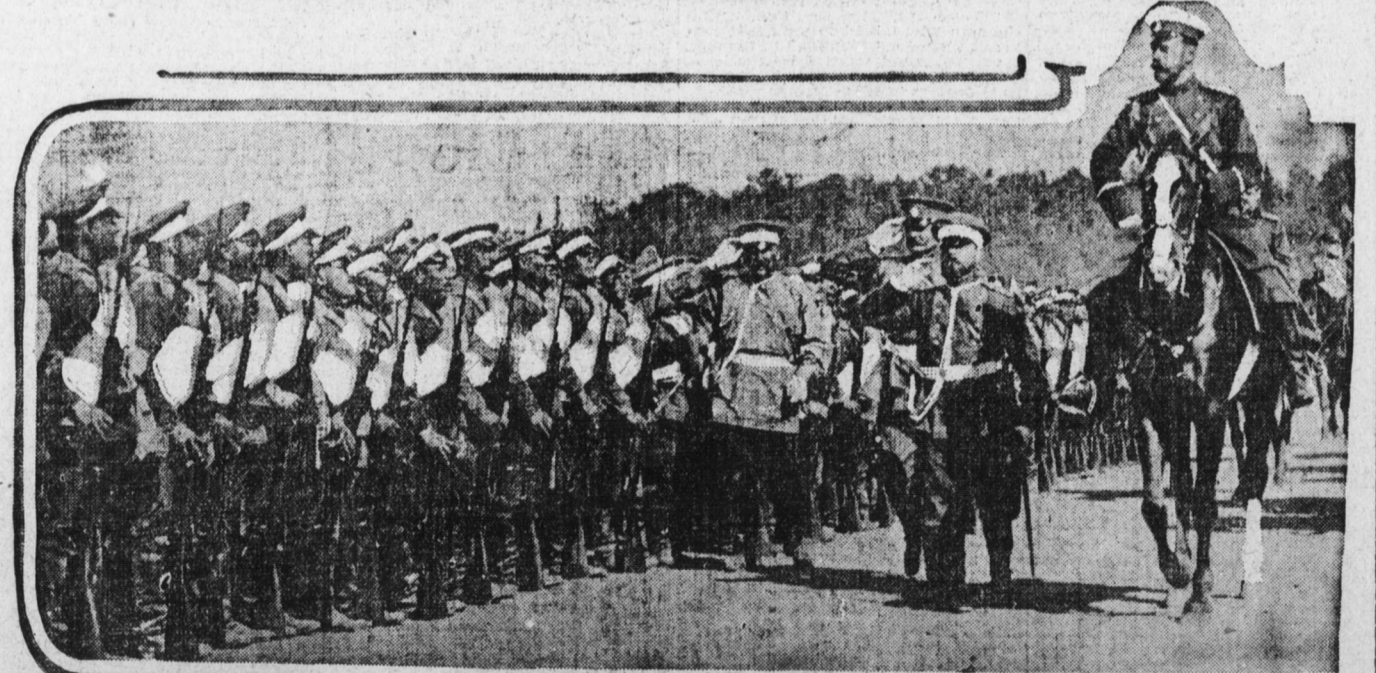
Hunters and Anglers Want Two Commissions United; Wildman Censured

At a meeting of the local branch of the Hunters and Anglers' Association last evening in the hall of Samuel H. Garland, the members voted to ask the Legislature to unite the fish and game commissions of the State.

The association also passed resolutions censuring Augustus Wildman for his vote on the hunters' license bill at the last session of the Legislature and a committee was appointed to interview the various legislative candidates in Dauphin county as to how they stand on matters of interest to the hunters and anglers.

Whereas, While the Hunters and Anglers' Protective Association of Pennsylvania is a nonpartisan organization and reluctant to engage in political strife of express party preferences, the members are morally pledged to oppose for office those who betray them by giving support to legislation so clearly antagonistic to the best interests of the hunters of the State, therefore, it is resolved that the members of the Hunters and Anglers' Association of Pennsylvania be requested to individually and collectively exert all their efforts and energy to defeat Augustus Wildman who is a candidate for re-election to the General Assembly for the district.
