Paris, Aug. 3.—An appeal to the press issued this morning asks the newspapers to use caution in publishing news about the war which might help the enemy. The fact that France intends to mobilize her forces to the last man is indicated by a bill to be introduced in Parliament to-morrow permitting nen who have failed to present themselves for their term of cumpulsory military service to join the army now without liability to punishment. Some Americans here have offered to fight for France and a suggestion has been made that a corps of Americans should be organized here. All telegrams were refused at the post office in Paris for a period today, and it is assumed that the difficulties in the transmission of news and private dispatches will rapidly increase.

English Bank Exhausted

London, Aug. 3.—The Bank of England five-pound notes were exhausted Saturday and banks asking for notes got hundred-pound notes which were useless for most transactions. The printers worked busily over Sunday replenishing the supply. An issue of tenshilling notes has been discussed and an extension of the bank holiday three days is granted.

A Paris dispatch to the Daily Telegraph says all communication with Germany, either by telegraph or railway, has ceased as well as all railway communication with Belgium. No French train proceeds further than the frontier towards Belgium and Holland. The Germans have blown up the lines at all frontier stations. No trains are running in Belgium and more than 100,000 Germans in Paris are anxiously wondering how they are to return home.

"I want to have the pride of feeling that America, if nobody else, has herself possession and stands ready with calmness of thought and steadiness of purpose to help the rest of the world.

"And we can do it and reap a great."

"And we can do it and reap a great permanent glory out of doing it, provided we all co-operate and see that nobody loses his head. I know from my conferences with the secretary of the treasury who is in very close touch with the financial situation through-out the country that there is no cause for alarm. There is cause for getting busy and doing the thing in the right way, but there is no element of unsoundness and there is no cause for alarm. The bankers and business men of the country are co-operating with the government with a zeal, intelligence and spirit which make the outcome secure."


