Prussians Cut to Pieces by Rifemen

Every German discovered anywhere in the city is brought before the police, who have considerable trouble in protecting the prisoners from attack by the excited crowds.

Heads of Dead and Wounded

The attacking infantry crept up under cover of a heavy artillery fire, but the Belgian defenders reserved their fire until the Germans had come to close quarters, when at a given signal the Belgians opened with a perfect hail of bullets from rifles and machine guns.
