

county tax collectors just as on any other tax and the taxee may have the advantage of the rebate may have the advantage of the rebate may esterday in the County Commissioners' office in answer to queries as to wether or not the abatement held when the collectors of county taxes in the city sat in the Courthouse. "The 5 per cent. abatement holds good on all county taxes, occupation, or 'personal,' as it is called. as well as any other," said an official in the County Commissioners' office. "However, few folks ask for it, but it must be allowed if you ask."

Not that the abatement ordinarily would amount to enough to make a very extensive investment. As a rule the average assessment for occupation is based on the \$100 salary. Four mills for taxation runs the tax bill up to as much as 40 cents. And as has been mentioned before, 5 per cent. abatement is allowed.

So one merely by asking the tax collector may save as much as 2 cents. New Trial in Ensminger Case.—New trials were allowed by Judge McCarrell yesterday in the cases of Dr. John T. It is a picture taken at the time Austria's assult on Servia indicated the whole of Europe would be involved in a war. It was taken in front of the City Savings Bank, one of the larger institutions of Berlin, and is the first war photograph to reach the United States.

Runs on other banks have followed, not only in Germany, but over Europe, till many of the bankers are in a dangerous conditions.

Dr. Surface Gives Some Information About Numerous Amphibians in His Bulletin

State Zoologist H. A. Surface has issued a bulletin in which he demonstrates that the amphibia of Pennsylvania, consisting of nineteen kinds of salamanders, the mud pupples, the hellbenders, the newts, three kinds of toads and nine kinds of frogs are decidedly benificial to farmers and to the people at large. He has put dewn the results of years of investigation and says that analyses of the contents of 1456 stomach of 24 species of apmhibians has proved that they destroy snails, grasshoppers, sluss, moths, "thousand leggers" and such destructive and annoying pests.

The bulletin contains 150 pages and gives sceintific and ordinary information about the various amphibia. Among the varieties treated are these salamanders, Glant, blunt nosed, blotched, spotted, spreckled, tiger, Jefferson's, robacked, fourtoed, slimy

purple, two-lined, cave or long tailed, red, mountain, dusky and black. The doctor says he did not know there were so many salamanders in the State.
