During an argument over a technical point Van Scole, it is said, several times called the time limit on Manager Tinker, telling the local leader to send up the proper batter or he would forfeit the game to the visitors, but he did not carry out his threat, and his not doing so was displeasing to Gilmore.

How About Olympic Games? America Is Ready For a Call

Should Berlin Pass Up the Big Time Secretary Sullivan Will Get Busy

New York, Aug. 18.—In amateur athletic circles a question has arisen as to where the Olympic events should be held in the event of Berlin's being unable to take care of the big event because of war. It is also understood that the ten-year agreement between representatives of the services was contingent upon securing grounds in Washington for the game in alternate years and that negotiations will have to be taken up again, a possibility being that the game will not be played at all.

"I hope that Europe will be at peace again before 1916 and that there will be no need of a change in the program," Mr. Sullivan said. "If, however, a shift is necessary, the United States is the logical country in which to hold the games, and the American committee will carry out the schedule as planned by Germany without a hitch of any kind."
