Special Prayers for Peace in Roman Catholic Church

In every Roman Catholic church in the Harrisburg diocese special prayers were incorporated into all the masses and the rosary was recited by the congregations attending the last mass in each church. The observance was made in accord with the dying wish of the late pontiff that the faithful pray for the early cessation of the European strife.

At each mass the celebrant offered the prayer Pro Pace (for peace). At the conclusion of the late mass the priests led in the recital of the rosary. At the reading of parish announcements a letter from Bishop Shanahan

was read which called on all Catholics frequently to recite the rosary in their homes for the realization of the dying pontiff's wish.

The celebrants of the masses yesterday also made the announcement of the death of Pius X, while the congregation knelt in prayer. In every church in the diocese a requiem mass will be sung this week.

WAVY STOUGH TRAIL TRAILERS ARE WILY IN

Mount Carmel Traction Company
Head Tells of Results at
Mt. Carmel

Approximately 700 men and women attended the fifth preliminary mass meeting in the interest of the Stough campaign held at the Mt. Carmel Church yesterday afternoon.

An enthusiastic song service was conducted by Charles F. Clippinger, chairman of the music committee. Ex-Mayor E. Z. Gross, of Pine Street Presbyterian Church, presided.

G. Hean, of Grace Methodist Episcopal Church, offered prayer.

E. W. Samuel, M. D., of Mt. Carmel, general manager of the Shamokin and Mt. Carmel Street Railway Company, delivered the address of the day. He said in part:

"There were over 4,000 trail hitters in Mt. Carmel during the Stough campaign and 1,400 of them were men. The Methodist Episcopal Church received 225 new members; Presbyterian, 500; United Evangelical, 200 and engaged an architect to enlarge the church building. All churches in town increased 100 to 300 per cent. Harrisburg should have 10,000 conversions during the campaign.

The services next Sunday afternoon will be held in the Harris Street United Evangelical Church.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION SUBMITTED TO THE CITIZENS OF PENNSYLVANIA FOR THEIR APPROVAL OR REJECTION BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA, AND PUBLISHED BY ORDER OF THE SECRETARY OF THE COMMONWEALTH IN PURSUANCE OF ARTICLE XVIII OF THE CONSTITUTION.

Number One.

A JOINT RESOLUTION Proposing an amendment to section eight of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, that the following amendment to the Constitution of Pennsylvania be, and the same is hereby proposed in accordance with the eighteenth article thereof:

That section one of article eight, which reads as follows: "Every male citizen twenty-one years of age, possessing the following qualifications, shall be entitled to vote at all elections, sub-

ject, however, to such laws requiring and regulating the registration of electors as the General Assembly may enact."

"First. He shall have been a citizen of the United States at least one month.

"Second. He shall have resided in the State one year (or, having previously been a qualified elector or native-born citizen of the State, he shall have removed therefrom and returned, within six months) immediately preceding the election.

"Third. He shall have resided in the election district where he shall vote at least two months immediately preceding the election.

"Fourth. If twenty-two years of age and upwards, he shall have paid within two years a State or county tax, which shall have been assessed at least two months and paid at least one month before the election," be amended so that the same shall read as follows:

Section 1. Every citizen, male or female, of twenty-one years of age, possessing the following qualifications, shall be entitled to vote at all elections, subject, however, to such laws requiring and regulating the registration of electors as the General Assembly may enact:

"First. He shall have been a citizen of the United States at least one month.

"Second. He or she shall have resided in the State one year (or, having previously been a qualified elector or native-born citizen of the State, he or she shall have removed therefrom and returned, then six months) immediately preceding the election.

"Third. He or she shall have resided in the election district where he or she shall vote at least two months immediately preceding the election.

"Fourth. If twenty-two years of age and upwards, he or she shall have paid within two years a State or county tax, which shall have been assessed at least two months and paid at least one month before the election.

"Fifth. The words "he" and "himself" occur in any section of article VIII of this Constitution, or in any law enacted or hereafter to be enacted, as if written, respectively, "he or she," "his or her," "him or her," and "himself or herself."
