That the following amendment to the Constitution of Pennsylvania be, and the same is here-by, proposed, in accordance with the eighteenth article thereof:--That section one of article eight, which reads as follows: "Section 1. Every male citizen twenty-one years of age, possessing the following qualifications, shall be entitled to vote at all elections, sub-ject, however, to such laws requiring and regulating the registration of elec-tors as the General Assembly may en-act: "First. He shall have been a citizen
