Nor are these the only pests which the electrical engineer in the Orient encounters. House lizards seeking dark, cool places in which to rest often crawl into electric light meters and lay their eggs on the magnetic-drag disks. The Philippine ants, too, like to build their nests in automatic signals. Annoyance from these native pests has, however, been presented to a great extent by sealing up all openings with pitch.—Electrical World.
